NOT WORTHY OF CONSIDERATION

In the last issue of the Union Republican there appears a three column article signed Mr. L. J. Davis, under the head of "A new County Idea." This article reviews the history of Union county from 1864 to the present time, and deals at length with the various county seat battles and finally winds up with the startling assertion that in order to best insure peace and prosperity to the citizens of Union county, a new county should be formed.

It seems strange to us that the peace, prosperity and future happiness of the people of Union county could in any way be effected by an imaginary line run around a certain territory. How this line could effect a business relations or friendly ties of one portion of this county as regards another is a mystery we are unable to penetrate. So far as the war which he says was declared many years ago continuing to exist we believe the gentleman is in error. So far as a personal

warfare there has never been any. The citizens of Union have come exactly as the people of La Grande would have done had their conditions been reversed, and the same is true of the citizens of La Grande.

In view of the fact that the people of the county at large have settled the "County Seat Question" to their satisfaction irrespective of personality of the two towns, it would seem to us very unwise for a few sore heads to attempt to dig up some new issue to cause dissension among the different sections of the county along the lines suggested. The "New County Idea" is really not worthy of any serious consideration.

The war between Russia and Japan is bothering farmers' shipowners and merchants. The strike in Chicago is troubling cattle owners and meat eaters. The weevil is tormenting the cotton raisers and the coming election is worrying hosts of people.
