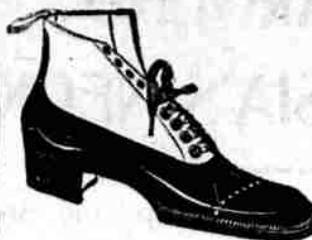

The railroad picnic to be given on the 21st of this month promises to be the big event of this month, and will take place at Meacham. The rate of 75 cents for the round trip has been secured. Special features will be announced later.

Mr. and Mrs. A. B. Huelat of Island City, and Mrs. Molden of this city, are the only campers at present at Prospect ranch. A B killed a fine large deer a few days ago which was liberally sampled by all who were fortunately camped there. Mr. and Mrs. Garrity and family, Mrs. Fred Kiddle and Mr. C. H. Bidwell, who were formerly of the party, have returned.

Henry Gressman of Summerville was a business caller at our office today and reports that many farmers who thought they were badly damaged by the frost now find that they have sustained very little injury and that orchards that were considered a total loss are loaded with fruit. Mr. Gressman states that the potato crop will be short in this valley this year, however he does not think that we will have to import any and many growers will have good yields.

Parties who have returned from points up the river report a very light huckle berry crop.

They say this is the kind of weather that puts the sugar into the beets if that theory is correct with the assured large tonnage this season the factory will be able to fill their warehouse to the ceiling.

While many of our citizens are going to the mountains this year from this city, few are going to the springs. Pendleton seems to be the heaviest patron this season.
