WOUNDED BY HORSE THIEVES

Antelope Ore. Aug. 8—News has just reached here that in a battle with horse thieves Under Sheriff James Steele was shot in the mouth early this morning and mortally wounded.

The thieves, who are supposed to be a ex-convict named Lovjoy and a young fellow named Gibbons, stole three horses from ranchers on Friday of last week. Wednesday a telephone message was received from Brigmen stating that the thieves were in that neighborhood and Deputy Steele and a posse of 10 men started in pursuit. This morning the posse came in touch with the outlaws who immediately opened fire with their revolvers. A battle then commenced which lasted until the wounding of Deputy Sheriff Steele when the thieves availed themselves of the confusion and escaped. As soon as the news was received of the battle, Sheriff J. W. Ambrose of Grant county and two deputy sheriffs from Wheeler county and two ranchmen started in pursuit of the robbers, one of whom is thought to have been wounded during the battle.

The county authorities of Wheeler and Wasco counties have offered a reward of \$400 for the apprehension of each of the men. Lovjoy, who is supposed to be one of the thieves, was discharged from the Walla Walla penitentiary about two months ago where he served a term of five years for horse stealing. Gibbons, who is thought to be the other man, is a ranch and who has been in this part of the country for about a year.

Lumber from Portland

The August shipment of lumber from Portland Oregon will reach 15,000,000 feet. Two large steamers cleared the other day for the city with 6,000,000 feet. To others now in port and loading will carry on different places, 9,500,000 feet of other lumber ships and barges are on the way to Portland for cargo.

Ordered To Turkey

Washington Aug. 8.—The European squadron has been ordered to Turkish waters. The ships under Admiral Jewell are the Olympia, Baltimore and Cleveland. The destination of the fleet is Smyrna.

HELD NEGROES IN BONDAGE

Chicago, Aug. 8.—A special to the Tribune from Savannah, Ga. says: State Senator Foye of Egypt, Ga., has been brought here under arrest by federal officers on a charge of holding negroes in bondage. Foye is one of the wealthiest men in south Georgia and is a Democratic leader. He conducts several large turpentine farms near Egypt, and federal officers assert that he is holding many negroes as slaves. The negroes are confined at night in stockades and are worked in chains during the day.
