## SAYS HE HAS BURIED MONEY

Pendleton Ore. Aug. 15.—Ralph Ward, a confectionary dealer, whose store was closed under an attachment by the sheriff Saturday, was arrested today in Walls Wall and brought back to Pendleton charged with attempting to defraud his creditors.

Anna M. Marshall swore to the complaint. She owned the building in which Ward has his place of business, and claims back rent for eight months, amounting to \$381, due her.

The complaint charges that the defendant has considerable money buried and otherwise concealed which he refuses to use in the payment of his debts. This charge was vigorously denied by Ward when he arrived today in the custody of the sheriff.

## Boy Drowned

North Yakima, Aug. 17.—Walter the 3 year old foster child of Mrs. W. L. Tomlinson of Spokane, was drowned in the Hubbard ditch near this place yesterday.

The child had gone to the ditch to get water and sat down on a board to dangle his feet in the flowing stream. He fell off the board and was carried down the stream.

Mrs. Tomlinson had taken the child from the Home Finding Association a few weeks ago with the intention of adopting him, and came here last week to visit her brother.

## An 18 Inch Gash

Genesee Idaho Aug. 15.—A serious cutting affray occurred at the Simpson ranch, on the reservation, eight miles south of here, this morning in which Melvin Simpson a well known squaw man was carved by George Miller of this place.

Simpson was brought to town early this morning by Drs. Conant and Eulen who attended to his wounds. He has a severe cut in the back near the shoulder blade, across the body, about 18 inches long. It is an ugly wound but not necessarily dangerous unless complications set in.

## HEAVY FIRES IN IDAHO

Cataldo Ida. Aug. 17.—Residents of this town and vicinity have been fighting fire for three days and nights to save their property. Timber and brush is exceptionally dry and much loss has been wrought by the flames.

## Another Blow

St. Petersburg, August 16.—The news of the defeat of the Vladivostok squadron has added another crushing blow to the reverse before Port Arthur. The Che Foo report of last night of the sortie of the Russian ships from Port Arthur naturally cannot be confirmed, and the admiralty is puzzled to know whether it refers to ships

which remained in the harbor, or ships of the late Admiral Witte's original squadron. In either event, it is construed that the shells of the Japanese land batteries are falling in the harbor rendering it impossible for ships to remain there any longer. It is also interpreted in some quarters as indicating the eve of the storming of the fortress.

Wallace, Idaho, August 17.—At a mass meeting of the socialists of Shoshone county held yesterday afternoon in the Tribune hall a full county and legislative ticket was nominated.

## TWO BURNED AT STAKE

Two negroes, Paul Ried and Will Gates were executed on August 16 at Statesboro, Georgia, of the murder of the Hodges family and were sentenced by the court to be hung on September 9.

Savannah, Ga., Aug. 16.—Advices just received here by telephone say the mob overpowered the guards and took Gates and Ried to stakes, where they are at this hour being burned.

Five negroes were also given a terrific rawhide lashing, and others warned to be more respectful to whites. Two of the negroes lashed may not recover from their wounds.

## Spokane Fire

Spokane, Aug. 17.—Fire broke out in the smoke house of the Stanton Cold Storage company this morning and before it was brought under control destroyed property valued at \$130,000.

## MAYOR TURNED DOWN.

### Packers Refuse Mayor's Offer of Mediation and Claim Plants are Working Full Force.

Chicago, Aug. 16.—At a secret meeting of the mayor and representatives of the packers it is understood that the mayor was informed by the packers that there would be no reopening of peace negotiations. They claimed to be working the plants almost to their full capacity and that the strike was won therefore they would not consent to compromise with the strikers as it was utterly impossible to discharge new employees to make room for the strikers. Undaunted by the uncompromising attitude of the packers Mayor Harrison arranged for a meeting with President Donnelly and other representatives of the unions to day and is still hopeful that a common meeting ground will be found. Donnelly however has given up hope of a settlement and said today: "I have no propositions to make and don't think the mayor can do any thing. We will tell him of the situation treat him courteously, however."

Everything is quiet in the stock yards district this morning.

### MEDITATION A FAILURE

Mayor Harrison at the close of his conference with the labor leaders expressed his willingness to meet the packers but they were indifferent. He stated that while the packers claimed they had the strike won they would learn the contrary to be true. He would be willing to meet any agency likely to promote peace but admitted his efforts have so far been a failure. He has no further peace plans in view but will take advantage of any further opportunity to mediate. T. A. Carroll, special agent of the department of commerce and labor admitted today he was engaged with 18 assistants in investigating the alleged beef trust and the present labor difficulties.
