HEAT AND HEALTH
 People are prone to complain more at hot weather than cold. It has become a fad with many to growl at hot weather as though there is poison in sunshine and disease in heat and death in the air when the mercury gets up to the nineties. The facts of life do not sustain the general notion that what we call hot weather is dangerous to human health and a potential cause of sickness and death.

Let us take a stroll through the grave yards in the United States and see on what months the reaper Death is most industriously engaged. In the year 1900 there were 1,039,094 deaths in the United States. The death rate by months in 1900, as given by the United States census reports vol IV, vital statistics, pages 882-883 is in January 89,912, February 89,757, March 107,490, April 104,618, May 98,739, June 69,453, July 82,972, August 86,030, September 79,290, October 77,738, November 72,886 and December 79,510

During the census year, 1,999 deaths were noted as unknown, meaning the month was unknown. By comparing the monthly deaths our readers will perhaps be surprised to find that 20,459 more deaths occurred in January than in June, and that there were 6,785 more deaths in the short winter month of February than in the summer month of July.

Take January, February and March as the cold months and we find that 287,159 persons died during those three months, compare these winter months with the three summer months June, July and August and we find there were 238,455 funerals in summer or 47,704 more persons died during the winter months than in the summer months.

Another fact will be discovered, that next to June, November the month of fruit, nuts, pumpkin pies and spare ribs, is the healthiest month in the year while March the equal of November for bluster and wind has large number of deaths than any month in and will year, being credited in 1900 with 107,490 deaths followed by July with 104,618 funerals. It might be urged that the mortality of the two spring months is the result of the "invigorating cold" of the preceding winter.
