**Outlook From Farms**  
The monthly Crop Reporter for August issued by authority of the secretary of Agriculture reached the Observer Saturday morning. From it the outlook of the American farmer is rather a cheerful one both as to crop yield and prices.

The average yield of winter wheat or the whole United States per acre is given on August 1 at 12.3 bushels, Oregon's average yield at 21.4 bushels per acre.  
The average condition of spring wheat on August 1 was 57.5 against 77.1 on same date last year.  
The department estimates the spring wheat crop this year will be 353,400,000 bushels.  
The average condition of corn was 57.3, last August the average was 56.5. The range of prices this August for both spring and winter wheat is better than on August last year. On August 5, 1934, No. 1 northern spring wheat was quoted in Chicago at \$1.05 to \$1.08 per bushel against .77 1/2 to .90 1/2 for August 1933.  
No. 2 red winter wheat for a float on August 5 was quoted at New York at \$1.01 to \$1.07 against .83 1/2 to .89 1/2 cts for August 1933.

## NOMINEE RESIGNS

Idaho State Central Committee Thrown Into State of Great Consternation.

Boise City, August 29—There was consternation at the headquarters of the Democratic central committee when they received the resignation of their congressional nominee Hon. F. H. Holzheim. The following is a copy of the letter sent to Chairman C. H. Jackson.

Hon. C. H. Jackson, Chairman Democratic State Com. Boise Idaho.  
My dear sir:—  
When I accepted the congressional nomination at the hands of the Democratic party of the state of Idaho in convention assembled, I fully believed that even though the resolution on the Mormon question had been incorporated in our state platform, the matter could be settled and handled in a manner which would be satisfactory and honorable to all concerned. Now however, conditions have arisen since my nomination, and which conditions have arisen because of the fact that at the meeting of the Democratic state committee held in Lewiston, after the convention adjourned, the campaign to be waged in our state was outlined and it appears that the campaign, as it is said, is to be waged on a moral plane as against the Mormon people and the said resolution is to be made the paramount issue. This being true, and as I am not in sympathy or in full accord with the same, I cannot in honor to myself after the position I took in the Democratic convention, both in committee and upon the floor of the convention remain upon the ticket, and make the necessary campaign outlined by our state committee, and therefore must at this time, and therefore do now, tender to the state committee through you as chairman, my resignation as the congressional nominee of the state of Idaho upon the Democratic ticket. Having a deep sense of gratitude for the high honor conferred upon me, I have arrived at this conclusion, only after careful deliberation. The confidence shown me by my party is one for which any man may justly feel proud, but the only way I can ever hope to retain that confidence in the future which I believe to be the only honorable one that I can pursue. This action of mine is a purely personal one and will effect only me, but will make it possible for the state committee to place upon our state ticket some one who can consistently make the campaign as outlined, and be in full accord with the state committee. I believe in our grand old Democratic

party and the principles for which it stands and will do all in my power for its success in the state of Idaho, knowing that right will prevail and believing as I do, that only through that party the greatest good will come to the people of this county. With nothing but good wishes for Democratic success I have the honor to remain, Yours very truly,
