J L Caviness is building three silos about nine feet in diameter, twenty two feet high and will soon start in furnishing the La Grande creamery with the product of not less than twenty cows. His original idea was to only build two silos but the yield of his three acres in corn was so heavy that it required three. Mr. Caviness is going to carefully weigh every load when he hauls it and believes it will exceed fifteen tons to the acre. Quite a number of our farmers who are patronizing the creamery are taking no small interest with the experiment and the success that is now assured will result in many silos being built next year. Silos are not entirely an experiment in this valley, several having found them profitable by experience.
