DECEPTION OF PERCENTAGE

The candidate for vice president on the democratic ticket gave his friends a text, from which to discourse during the coming campaign when he uses these words:

"Our republican friends are prone to refer to the great commercial growth of the country under their rule, and yet the census reports show that from 1850 to 1860, under democratic and the Walker tariff, the percentage of increase was greater in population, wealth, manufactures and railroad mileage than in any decade since."

The impression which Senator Davis evidently desired to make upon his hearers and reader was that in the decade mentioned the growth of the country was greater in population, wealth, manufactures and railroad mileage than in any ten years since, and by ardently using the term "greater percentage" in connection with the census reports he evidently hoped the public would conclude that the official figures bore evidence that sustained his assumption that greater growth in all the factors of wealth did take place in the decade between 1850 and 1860 than in any other ten years since. Senator Davis knew the official figures would not bear out the impression he sought to make, but he was endeavoring enough to use the term "percentage" as a pathway to escape, if called to account.

Per cent is a safe measure of actual increment when the basis of calculation is fixed. To illustrate, had some one of Senator Davis' hearers asked him to state during what year in the history of the world did the human race increase with the greatest percentage, he would have been obliged to say the first year after the marriage of Adam and Eve. For prior to the birth of Cain there were but two human beings on earth. When he came there were three, making an increase of 50 per cent, a percentage of growth of population that has never been equalled since and cannot be until the basis is but two.

When the immigration to Oregon in the fall of 1843 reached the Willamette Valley it increased the whole population (at that time about 250 persons) by 1000. This made an increase of 400 per cent. The incoming of a thousand immigrants into Oregon today, when the population is 500,000 people, would only be one-fifth of one per cent. To make an increase to our present population equivalent to 400 per cent two million people would have to come to Oregon, but when there were but 250 persons in Oregon the addition of 1000 raised the population 400 per cent. According to Senator Davis' jockeying with percentage more people came to Oregon in 1843 than in any other year because the percentage of increase in that year was the largest in its history.
