Geo. B Stoddard, manager of the sugar factory, stated this morning that he expected the factory would commence on the new crop between the 10th and 15th of September and that present prospects warranted the belief that the total yield of the valley would be 20,000 tons. This will be the largest yield in the history of the beet industry in this section and on a smaller acreage than has heretofore been cultivated. One of the reasons assigned by Mr. Stoddard was the fact that about two thirds of the acreage this year had been under irrigation and nearly all had been in the best culture for several years. The factory is now running on last year's syrup.

Sheriff C C Pennington was in the city posting notices in the various precincts as required by law giving notice throughout the county that on and after the 3rd day of September the county seat of Union county would be at La Grande. This is in effect quite similar to the custom of political parties notifying their presidential nominees by committee several weeks after the conventions that they have been nominated. However in the former case the law requires that it shall be done in this manner.
