

CAPTURE A STRONG DEFENSE.

Japs Capture Chair Fort, One of
the Strong Defences of
Port Arthur.

London, Aug. 24.—The Evening
News this afternoon publishes a dis-
patch from Chefoo dated today an-
nouncing that the Japanese have cap-
tured "Chair Fort," one of Port Arthur's
important defenses yesterday, or a
tremendous task. This is believed
to be a portion of the main line of
the capture of Tsingtao, known as
the "Chair Fort."

This is almost in the center of a
chain of forts of which it forms one.
It is a very important point in the de-
fense of Port Arthur.

NEGRO SHOT AND BURNED

Cedartown, Ga., August 24.—Jim
Glover, a negro was shot to death to-
night near the home of a little girl he
had assaulted and his body dragged a
distance of about a mile into this city
and burned on the public square. A
mob estimated at 500 compassed the
shooting and burning party.

The crime for which the negro was
punished was a random assault upon
Lena Reeves, 13 year old daughter of
a well known farmer. The crime was
the most revolting in any part of or
section of the country. After the
little girl had protected the negro from
the attack of a large dog owned by her
father he followed her to the pasture
where she was taking the cow, caught
her, choked her into insensibility and
left her bleeding and unconscious in
the cornfield. This was early this
morning.

Bloothorn had been on the negro's
trail all day and he was captured some
distance away into this of erosion and
carried to the home of the girl who un-
hesitatingly identified him as her
assailant, in the meantime the crowd
had gathered, and summary justice
was meted out to the negro. The neg-
ro confessed his guilt.

SEVERAL ARRESTS RESULT

Things Promise to be
Interesting In Baker
City as Result of the
Sheriff's Action.

Yesterday, twenty-two of Baker
City's tax payers and business men
had complaints filed against them
mostly of two separate charges to wit,

articles in their line of business.

busy serving warrants of arrest on the

Warrants for the arrest of Bert
Wood, who is camping somewhere in
the mountains, Th. Thornton, who is
visiting in Ireland, Clark Snyde, Th
Dumphy and Gertidge, who are now
at Sumpter. They were all cited to
appear before Justice Currey at 10
o'clock this morning.

A postponement was taken until 2
o'clock this P.M. to meet at the court
house. At that hour the court room
was crowded with leading citizens and
tax payers who are interested in the
contest. Promptly at the hour named
the Judge called the court to order.
On behalf of the defendant's Attorney
C. A. Johnson requested that the case all
go over until ten o'clock tomorrow
morning at which time he thought the
defenses would be able to take up the
case. On behalf of the state, District
Attorney Lounix stated that as the
defenses were entitled to look into their
defenses he believed that the request
ought to be granted. The Judge on
calling the cases over until tomorrow
morning impressed upon the defendants
that they appear here for trial promptly
as the hour indicated and by them
to understand that 11 o'clock. He
also stated that he being personally
acquainted with each and every one of

the defendants he would permit them
to go on their own recognizance.

The court then adjourned until to-
morrow morning at 10 o'clock a.m.
No arrangements have yet been made
as to the order of the cases. That the
public is interested in the movement
goes without saying. It is the sole
topic of conversation, and the subject
is discussed pro and con as to the
probable result should the matter ter-
minate in one way or the other.—Baker

Take Care of Your Trophies

I will pay from \$2 to \$10 for male deer heads, by
order according to directions. The dotted line on
neck and head show where to rip the skin. To
your game cut the jugular as low down as possible
never cut the throat. Commence to skin by mak-
ing a cut from the base of the horn to back of the neck
thence down the back of the neck to top of should-
er. Then around the side to point of brisket, work the skin carefully up
from the base of the horns. Then the ear is reached cut off those to skull
afterwards remove the flesh whether eye is red or run the finger in front
the outside and raise up the eye lid to avoid cutting it. Then the teats
which is near the corn of the eye, work the skin out of the cavity
with the point of the knife, then the corner of the mouth is reached
through and expose the teeth, leave all the black hair on the teeth
the cartilage on the nose. Salt neatly and roll up for 24 hours then dry
the shade. Unless salted well and dried in the shade, your work is at
work the brain out the hole at back of head. Save the under jaw bones
dry the skin keep it from wrinkling. I will also mount your trophy
