Men Scarce

Chicago, Ill. Aug. 24.—According to Hector Fuller war correspondent of the Indianapolis News, who has just returned from the orient Japan is denuded of good men and her funds are running so low that she will be bent on sheer lack of resources. Mr. Fuller, who is at the Auditorium Annex is said to be the only white foreigner who has entered and escaped from Port Arthur since the war began. "The world has not the slightest conception of the losses of the Japanese—up to date," said Mr. Fuller. "They have lost 120,000 men while the reports to the outside world indicate only 10 per cent of that number. All Japanese official figures given out are grossly misrepresented and underestimated and no one in the island dares publish the truth. There seems to be an opinion in the island that the fall of Port Arthur will mean that the end of the war is in sight. This is absurd."

Goes To Jail

Because she was unable to procure the \$25 cash bail required, Mrs. Ellen Shea, of 509 Hood street, the mother of Danny Shea, the well known Portland ballplayer, and of 12 other children, was yesterday morning locked up in the city jail on a charge of the use of abusive language. The arrest grew out of a neighborhood quarrel. When taken to the station night before last Mrs. Shea was released until yesterday morning to procure bail, and it was thought that she would be able to do so. Yesterday morning she returned to the jail with the statement that she had been unable to secure the bail, and she was immediately locked up. Four of the youngsters of her children were taken from their mother and turned over to the Boys' and Girls' Aid Society. The parting scene was pathetic and as the children were carried away their aged mother was taken weeping back to her cell. The children given to the care of the society are James, Lawrence, Josephine and Ann. The mother's case will come up before Judge Hogue in the municipal court this morning—Oregonian.

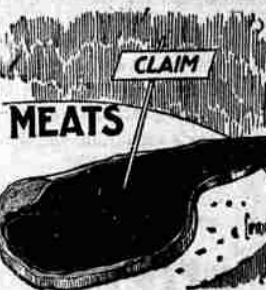
