F S Bramwell, field superintendent for the sugar company, states that the best harvest will begin September 10. From present indications it is will be the banner best season. The stand is almost perfect and tonnage will certainly be the heaviest in the history of the factory.

Very little wheat has been sold in this valley. Many who have threshed are storing in the mills and warehouses but expect to hold until the market is a little more settled.

Mrs. J W Dickey and granddaughter Genevieve, came down from Baker City last evening and at present are visiting her sister Mrs. A C Huntington. Mr. Dickey is expected this evening and it is their intention to make La Grande their home again.

Oregon has selected, under the Carey act, which expired on August 18th, 421,616 acres of arid land for irrigation, the government having approved about 100,000 of these selections. No more land can now be set aside under this act, although the irrigation projects begun under it will be completed.

A walk over the city will prove the assertion that there are many side walks that should be repaired with entirely new structures. A prominent citizen remarked while it might be a little premature at this time to abolish all fences he believed that the adoption of only cement side walks would be proper.

Petitions are now being circulated throughout the county to secure a vote on the county as a whole at the November election on the Local Option law. As only ten per cent of the vote cast last June is required on the petition and as the county voted in favor of local option the required number of petitioners will be easily secured.

James Masterson, one of Elgin's leading business men, returned home this morning. He states that they are in the midst of their harvest which is resulting very satisfactorily. The lowest yield he has heard of was 25 bushels and many as high as 40. If present prices prevail, Mr. Masterson says the growers of the north end of the valley will receive more money for this season's crop than they did last year.

The public school library now contains seven hundred and fifty books. Yesterday two hundred new books were added to the list. This is one of the finest libraries in Eastern Oregon and speaks well for the school. Professor Hockenberry will soon have the number up to one thousand. The library now contains nearly all the leading works of fiction, history and works of reference.
