ARMY CHANGES OF IMPORTANCE

Washington, Aug. 29.—Gen. Grant will take command of the department of the east September 6. General Frederick Funston has notified the war department he is willing to take the detail of the department of the lakes, made vacant by the transfer of Grant. Funston preferred the department of the Columbia, but when he found G. N. Williams, who had been assigned there already enroute with his household effects, Funston accepted the post at Chicago.

Merited Promotion

The State Department, appreciating the most excellent service which the Hon. H. B. Miller has rendered the nation as U. S. Consul at New Orleans, has promoted him to the position of Consul General. Mr. Miller is a citizen of Oregon who was president of the State Agricultural College for several years. His new position carries a salary of \$3,000 per year.

Charged With Insanity

Joseph S. Maxwell who arrived Saturday from the soldiers home at Posenburg was enroute to his home in Walla Walla county was placed in charge of the officers Monday and was taken to Union today to be examined by Judge Harrison as to his sanity. The unfortunate man has been a resident of Walla Walla county several years and at one time was marshal of Enterprise and was in the asylum for a short period and released a few years ago. He is not vicious, but as he is reported to have attempted to take his life, it was thought best to take care of him and investigate the case.

Big Flow Of Water

Gifford, Idaho, Aug. 29.—The striking of a large vein of water in the new Gifford well has encouraged the farmers of the Gifford county. The water was found at a depth of 100 feet and a flow of 150 gallons an hour has been secured.

WON'T ASK FOR LOCAL OPTION

Salem, Ore., Aug. 29.—In an interview a prominent officer of the Anti-Saloon league said that Marion county, which went against local option in the recent election, will not be asked to vote on local option unless saloonkeepers keep up their fight for an open Sunday.

Railroad Accident

Fort Worth, Tex., Aug. 27.—Four persons were severely injured in a collision between the Texas and Pacific Railroad fast passenger train and several freight cars at Exter street bridge, one mile outside of this city, late at night. Several passengers received very slight injuries.

Populist Headquarters.

New York, Aug. 29.—Thomas E. Watson, of Georgia, populist presidential candidate, will make New York

his headquarters and home during the campaign. He has engaged rooms at the Hoffman. There he and Mrs. Watson and daughter will be from September 1 on.

MEERSHAM IN IDAHO

A recent dispatch from Haily Idaho says: "Prof. Geo. Dolins and Joseph Montgomery have located a vast deposit of meersham that is claimed to be the only known deposit of pure silicate of magnesium in the world besides those in Norway and in Turkey. This deposit is situated on Soldier creek, about 1 1/2 miles east of Ballard's ranch and six miles northeast of Soldier. It is an enormous deposit, being over 15 feet in thickness, 3000 feet wide and 1000 feet long. Those dimensions were ascertained by many holes dug in the deposit."

COMES IN A HORRIBLE FORM

New York Aug. 29.—Plunged into a pool of muriatic acid with skulls fractured and arms and legs broken by the fall of the elevator in the Bab-bitt soap factory at 82 Washington street four men today died the most horrible deaths ever recorded in the history of the city.

Helpless, with broken limbs their eyes eaten out by the acid and imprisoned at the bottom of the elevator shaft, from which they could not be rescued by their fellow workers they were forced to endure their frightful suffering for nearly half an hour before they could be taken from their scorching, burning bath of acid. Two died tonight.

Two others lived with the flesh eaten from their bones until they had been carried to the Hudson street hospital.

Their shrieks could be heard for blocks and the men who were trying to reach them sickened and were forced to run away from the frightful scene with unbearably sounds from the pit in which the sufferers were being quickly tortured to death.

HOME CONSUMPTION OF WHEAT

It takes 375,000,000 bushels of wheat to bread the people of the United States one year.

For the 12 months ending with June 1904, the wheat exported from the United States amounted to 44,230,169 bushels for the same time there were 16,500,142 barrels of flour exported which at 1 1/2 bushels per barrel is equivalent to 24,750,213 bushels or less than one third as much as the home consumption requiring.

Few Left at Springs

Campers coming into the city yesterday from the mountain resorts say that there are very few people left at either Midway or Leham Springs and that another week will see the places deserted. The nights are getting too cool for comfort in the mountains.

Large Funeral

FS Ivanhoe, J. H. Pease, J. C. Smith, M. H. Kirtley, Mr. Tilson, Chandler McKennon of this city and C. H. Bidwell of Island City returned late in the evening from Joseph where they attended the funeral of the Hon. C. E. Jennings, which took place Saturday afternoon under the auspices of La Grande Lodge No. 433, R. F. O. E. Several Elks joined them at Elgin and there were forty Elks in attendance which was the largest funeral that was ever held in Walla Walla county. The interment took place in the Prairie creek cemetery a few miles out of Joseph. The deceased was 46 years of age, born in Illinois in 1858, and moved to Walla Walla county in 1888. He left a wife and four children. His estate is estimated all the way from \$20,000 to \$40,000, consisting in city and farm property, sheep and chattel.
