State News

Items of Interest From All Over the State, Gleaned From Observer List Of Exchanges

The grade of hops in Polk county is said to be the best in years, being free from mould and vermin. The yield in the best yards is from 100 to 1800 pounds to the acre. The pickers are numerous, and many are being refused employment.

In the Forest Grove district the hops are fine and the yield is large. Large crowds are gathering in and around Forest Grove camping and waiting for the work of picking to begin.

J. R. Franlin, of Pendleton, committed suicide Tuesday night at that place by taking morphine. The deceased was fifty-two years of age and leaves several grown children.

Robert Stoppen, the man who stabbed Arthur D. H., in Eugene, Saturday night, has been caught.

Four Portland swimmers were caught in a whirlpool at Columbia Beach, Monday, and narrowly escaped drowning.

A Canadian excursion consisting of 180 people from all points in Western Canada, visited Portland Monday, in a tour of the state of Oregon.

Miss Bertha Slater, of La Grande, was the guest of her brother, R. J. Slater, yesterday and until late morning. She was enroute from the G. and N. Round trip to Eugene, where she is a tutor in the State University. Miss Slater stands at the head of the women engaged in educational work in this state, her abilities and acquirements being acknowledged in all educational circles.

A serious fight occurred at New Port by the sea Sunday in which Joo Chis well was stabbed several times by J. D. Read. The fight occurred about two women. When the marshall attempted to arrest Read, he was defied and threatened with a knife, and in self-defense was compelled to shoot Read, the ball entering the neck on the left side and coming out on the right cheek.

Senator Wm. Smith has just completed the bill of exceptions in the matter of the appeal of A. L. Brown et al, appellants vs Baker county, appellees. Mr. Smith is attorney for several of the appellants who were bondsmen on the stuntington Sheriff bond that is the cause of Baker county bringing its action against the appellants.

Mrs. Ann Hendricks, a Lane county pioneer, died at her home at Hendrick's Ferry, 15 miles east of Eugene, Friday and Sunday, is still burning, but since the timber on the steep sides of the canyon has been burned off the fire does not make much progress in the green timber, and will, it is thought, burn itself out in a few days. It is not doing much damage today, but is still burning steadily.

In Full Retreat

So far as electricity flashes revealing light upon the movements of the Russian and Japanese a nice defeat of the Russians at Liao Yang on the south bank of the Taitso river was a crushing blow to Czar's forces, and at the whole Russian army is now in headlong retreat upon Mukden some fifty miles from the battle field. The Japs are in close pursuit with strong flanking parties out endeavoring to bring the retreating hordes to a stand and crush it. The Russians will have to cross Hunner to reach Mukden, when another fierce fight will most probably take place.
