Portland Markets

There is a large supply of the lower grades of creamery butter in the market, and prices in this line have run down to 22 1/2c per pound, but the fancy and better grades still remain at the former prices of 27 1/2c.

Eggs still remain about the same, the best local stocks being firm at 25c, while the eastern shipments are selling at one cent under this figure. The arrivals of local stock are very small.

There is a good outlook for the entire local poultry market as the larger dealers are almost out of stock and are picking up everything that comes. Good, fat chickens command the highest price in the poultry market at the present time.

Business in the wheat market is practically at a standstill at the present time on account of the slump in the Chicago market making the ruling prices in this territory too high to permit of buying for eastern shipments. The farmers are not selling at the prevailing prices on the market. So things are at a standstill, watching the Chicago market.
