AGAINST LOCAL OPTION

Pendleton Sept 23—An organization was formed last night for the purpose of combating the local option forces in their attempt to carry Umatilla county against saloons. The meeting was held in the rooms of the Commercial association after that body had adjourned.

Fourteen local business men and property owners were present. Mayor W F Matlock was elected chairman of the meeting and J R Dickson secretary. Those present were called upon to express their views as to what should be done in the matter. F G McIntosh informed those present of what steps had so far been taken by the local option people in the fight. According to his statement the county petition yet lacked one hundred names of having the number required to make it effective. Speaking for the saloon men he said he thought it was for those of his profession to remain in the background but that through the Retail Liquor Dealers association they could confer with the newly formed body. Turning the papers he had over to the secretary he then bade the members good night.

Judge Lowell who had lingered after the adjournment of the Commercial association was called upon for an opinion and in reply stated that he had been an advocate of local option and still was because it was an American measure. But as to the matter of shutting the saloons out of Pendleton he did not consider that practical and was opposed to such action. The judge did not remain for the rest of the meeting.

T G Taylor stated that he was opposed to local option and would fight it in every way possible devoting both time and money. Others followed in a like strain and it was decided to form a permanent organization to oppose the carrying of the county against saloons. A motion was made by Lee Teutsch a committee of three be appointed to draw up by laws and formulate a plain of action. The committee as finally selected is as follows: J A Borie, J H Raley and J R Dickson. The meeting then adjourned to meet again next Tuesday night to form a permanent organization.

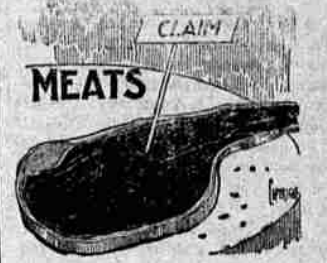
