State Atty's. Opinion

Salem, Ore. Sept. 27.—That the direct primary law does not go into operation until 1906 and need not be observed in municipal elections prior to that time is the opinion found by Attorney General Crawford after examining the question that has recently caused so much public discussion. That the direct primary law is now in effect, Mr. Crawford does not question but he says that by its own terms it is evident that it was not intended to become operative until 1906. He says also that previous laws governing primary elections have been repealed and that in his opinion candidates for municipal offices may be nominated by any method that has been pursued in the past.

He believes it will be best to proceed in accordance with the laws last in force not that those laws are now binding but because they provide a good system of making nominations and the people are familiar with them. Mr. Crawford believes that any form of nomination which results in a free expression from the voters at the polls will be upheld as legal. If the Attorney General's advice is followed the impending elections in Salem, Baker City and other cities may be held under the old election forms.

Typhoid In Logan

Robert F. Woodard sanitary inspector for the state board of health has returned from Logan where he went to investigate the typhoid fever conditions. There are about 30 cases of the disease in Logan and nearly all of them are confined to one section of the town. It is thought that the water, which is from private wells in that part of the town is responsible for the epidemic. Samples of the water were brought brought by Mr. Woodard and will be turned over to Chemist Harris for analysis.—Desert News.

Mrs. Aldrich of this city received a letter from Mrs. Ackery stating that Mr. Kuhn's arm and side was so badly scalded that it was necessary to take him to the hospital at Spokane where he is now resting as well as could be expected. The arm and side is completely raw the skin having been burned away, and it is necessary to change the dressings every two hours. The letter states that though he is seriously injured there is no reason to believe the effect will be fatal. Mr. Kuhn has many friends here who will be pained to learn of his bad fortune.
