Weather Conditions

GENERAL SUMMARY.

The droughty condition that has prevailed throughout the state during the last three months was partially relieved during the latter part of the week by good showers, which fell in nearly all the districts. While the rains were generally insufficient to place the soil in condition for plowing, they cleared the atmosphere or smoke, started grass on the ranges and pastures and revived all vegetation. They came too late, however, to be of much benefit to corn and potatoes. Light frost occurred on one or two mornings in scattered portions of the Willamette valley, slightly damaging late potatoes, tomatoes and tender vegetables.

Threshing will be completed in eastern Oregon in a week or ten days. The yields continue below the average, but the quality is good. Seeding on summer fallow is progressing nicely in the western section. In the Columbia River valley fall seeding is doing well, and the rains came in good season to insure an even stand. Corn cutting has begun, and in the dairy districts silos are being filled. In southern Oregon the third crop of alfalfa has been secured in good condition. In the eastern counties the rains interrupted work in the fields and there is considerable yet to be out. Potato digging continues, with small yields as a rule. In some of the coast counties and in scattered localities of eastern Oregon an average crop will be secured, but the total yield will be below the average.

Prune picking and drying is well under way; the yield of this fruit is very light, but the quality is good. Late apples are dropping more than usual, but still promise an abundant yield.

PLATEAU REGION.

Summerville, Union county, C. T. Colt.—Fine showers Thursday; forest fires extinguished and atmosphere cleared of smoke; a few days of thrashing to be done yet; wheat seeding in progress; prune picking will begin this week.

Haines, Baker county, J. K. Fisher.—Weather very dry until Thursday, when light rain fell; good rain Saturday; second crop of clover nearly all in the stack; thrashing nearly done; wheat close to the foothills good, but lower in the valley frosted so it will not do for milling purposes.

Deschutes, Crook county, John Atkinson.—First part of week warm, dry and smoky; latter part showery, with some thunder; some hay cut and not yet in stacks or barns will be damaged if the rains continue.

Note—As the staple crops of the state have either been secured or else are practically safe from future adverse weather conditions, this will be the last issue of the Weekly Crop Bulletin until next spring.

Echo Beets

The best crop near Echo and at Switzler's island has been shipped to La Grande. Owing to the failure to get water on the beets at the proper time on the Teel place at Echo and on those at Switzler's island, few beets from these places were shipped, as they were not of the best quality. Those of the S. I. Dale place were properly irrigated and yielded a fine crop. It is probable that a larger acreage will be planted the coming season.

Fire At Lewiston

Lewiston, Idaho, Sept. 29.—Lewiston experienced last night one of the worst fires in many years. Nothing but a wind from the east saved the business portion of the city from total destruction. The fire was discovered about 10 o'clock in the boiler repair shop of Hamblen brothers in the old Boston mill building at the head of Main street and Snake River avenue.

Chicago Unions Crumble

Chicago, Sept. 29.—The sensation caused by the announcement that 100,000 members of labor unions had ceased to pay dues in Chicago, was augmented today by an interview with Barney Cohen, president of the Illinois Federation of Labor, in which he said the union forces of the state were rapidly disintegrating and unless reorganized the destruction of all unions would speedily follow. He blames unwise leadership, political grafters and untimely strikes for the present crisis, and says that the unions must reorganize on a sounder basis, adopt methods now being used against the unions by the employers' associations and citizens' alliances.

CHILDREN CATCH STRIKE HABIT

Chicago, Sept. 29.—Fifty boy pickets were stationed about the McAllister public school and prevented the pupils from entering today. None of the pickets were more than 15 years old. Outside the picket squadron a crowd of 700 boys and girls nooted and yelled at the teachers, looking from the school windows, and every infant striker was a badge to show he belonged to the "union." Some of the badges were merely scraps of paper on which the word "union" was scrawled, others were their fathers' union buttons. Many of the strikers carried clubs and threatened violence to any child daring to enter the school yard. The picketing is the result of a "strike" caused by the mistaken belief of the children that the assistant kindergarten teacher is colored.
