HAND OF TREACHERY ON CONNECTICUT

Three Dastardly Attempts Made to Injure the United States Battleship Connecticut.

New York, Oct. 3.—The Herald to-morrow will say that three times in a half year the hand of treachery has failed in attempts to wreck the battleship Connecticut, launched at the New York navy yard Thursday. Only today the last drop of water was pumped from a compartment, filled from a hole bored through the half inch steel keel plates of the ship's bottom. The story says that six months ago holes were found bored through the

center rivets in the hull allowing a leakage. The second attempt was made when the ways were obstructed before the launching. The third effort was discovered soon after the vessel touched the water. In one of the compartments water was discovered. It entered through a hole bored through the keel plate. The compartment was quickly filled. There is no clue to the perpetrators of the outrages.

Safe Blown Open

Philadelphia, Oct. 3.—The safe in the postoffice at Rosemount, a suburb of the city, was blown open early today and money and stamps to the value of \$200 stolen. Dividend checks amounting to from \$5000 to \$10,000, addressed to wealthy suburbanites, were also taken.

General News

J. W. Woodward, a pioneer of Portland, died Friday. He came to the city in 1853.
The 59th annual session of the Congregational ministers and churches of Oregon has just closed at Portland.
Mary Battigle, the infant daughter of an Italian gardener, was drowned in a tub of water at Portland, Friday.
Dr. E. B. McDaniels, the youngest practicing physician in Baker City, will run for mayor of the town at the coming city election.
Police Officer Nelson, who was shot in Portland by Highwayman Walton, three weeks ago, has been discharged from the hospital recovered.

R. K. Brown, a miner, dropped 500 feet down a mining shaft at the Ymir mine, near Victoria, B. C., Thursday night. Death was instantaneous, every bone in his body being broken.
The women in charge of the Lewis and Clark souvenir coins have just received a card of thanks from Alice Roosevelt, for the first of the issue of these coins, which was presented to her by the Portland women.

Jay N. Saylor, of Astoria who pleaded guilty to a charge of robbery, was given four years in the penitentiary, Judge McBride remarking at the time of passing sentence that robberies are becoming too common.

Oregon Lumber

Astoria, Oct. 3.—Fifteen lumber cargoes were sent from the Columbia river during the month ending September 30. This does not include ten million feet contained in a log raft towed to San Francisco by the steamer Leggett. The total shipments exclusive of the log raft for the month, domestic and foreign, were 11,443,431 feet.

The Pension Roll

The Observer received Monday morning direct from the Pension office at Washington City the annual report of Eugene F. Ware, Commissioner of Pensions, for the year ending June 30, 1904, from which the following figures are tabulated:

On June 30, 1904, there were 994,762 names on the United States pension rolls to whom were paid \$141,093,571.49 in that year.
The United States has paid to pensioners since July 1, 1790, \$3,179,717,161.65. Of this \$3,163,271,717.42 has been paid since June 30, 1894.
The cost per capita for paying pensions is \$1.77.
On June 30, 1904, there were 7,007 persons in Oregon drawing pensions from the United States to whom were paid up to June 30, end of fiscal year, \$908,988.72.

INDIAN AGENT APPOINTED

John J. McKoin has been appointed superintendent of the Umatilla Indian agency schools to succeed Charles Wilkins, and is expected to arrive here about October 15. Mr. McKoin is at present in charge of the Soltz reservation, in Lincoln county, Oregon—Pendleton Oregon.

Late Survivors

Daniel F. Bakeman, the last survivor of the war of the Revolution, was born in Schoharie County, N. Y., September 23, 1723; died in Freedom, Cattaraugus County, N. Y., April 5, 1899; aged 109 years, 8 months and 8 days; and thus one of the heroes of the Revolution, who fought to bring the United States into existence, lived to see Lee surrender at Appomattox and to see Alaska purchased from Russia and added to the Union.
Hiram Cronk is the only surviving pensioned soldier of the war of 1812.

Senator Hoar's Son

Worcester, Mass., Oct. 3.—General Rockwood Hoar, son of the late United States Senator Hoar, will be nominated for congress by the republicans in the Third Massachusetts district, according to present plans. All the other aspirants have dropped out.

Gold & Silver Output

Washington, Oct. 2.—George E. Roberts, director of the mint, has completed the calculation of the production of gold and silver in the United States and the world for the year 1903.
The total gold output for the United States for the year was \$73,600,000 and silver \$29,300,000.
Of this amount Oregon produced \$1,300,000 in gold and \$64,000 in silver.
Washington produced \$280,000 in gold and \$160,000 in silver.
The total world's output for the year was \$325,500,000 in gold and \$92,000,000 in silver.
