## CAREY ACT IN FORCE

Salem, Ore., Oct. 4.—From a session just concluded by Commissioner W. A. Richards of the general land office it is found that the impression that the Carey act expired by limitation August 17 is incorrect, and that applications under that law are still in order. The commissioner points out that an amendment of March, 1903, gives him power to extend the time for filing applications indefinitely so that if all commissioners choose the act is virtually perpetual.

Although the Carey land act was passed by congress in 1890 which gave each state the privilege of reclaiming or having reclaimed 1,000,000 acres of arid land within its boundaries no advantage was taken of it in this state until the early part of 1901. Up to the present time applications have been received for the reclamation of 390,000 acres in round numbers.

Only one application has been held up in the state land department pending this decision and that application was forwarded yesterday afternoon to Washington. This application is for the reclamation of 11,766 acres of arid land in Crook county and was made by the Squaw Creek Irrigation company. The water is to be taken from Squaw Creek.
