PREPARE FOR AN INSURRECTION

Encouraged by Democratic Promises they Call Mass Meetings and Prepare to Throw off the "Yoke."

(Observer Special) Manila, Oct. 7.—American authorities who are in charge of the insular government fear that a crisis is approaching and that the vague promises made by democratic orators in the states will soon result in an agitation that will end in revolt and bloodshed. For months the discontent has been coming to a head and the chronic irritants who have learned the art of exciting their ignorant fellows have been using the democratic denunciations of the present island policy with telling effect among the hot-headed impulsive natives, who clad in a breechcloth long for a mysterious something called liberty which is typified in their minds by plenty of vino and much loafing on full pay.

That the movement has finally focused in something definite is proven by a proclamation which has been issued by some of the most notorious rebels in the islands ordering all "lovers of liberty" to gather in mass meetings on Sunday at the National theater. The call states its purpose in the following language: "The intent of the meeting being to take some definite action upon the popular decree, to wit: The giving our support and sympathy to the American committee on Philippine independence in its efforts to attain the end we desire. It would be inexplicable and even improper for Filipinos to fold their arms and remain passive at a time when the very best elements of American society are working ardently in order that our native land may attain its ambition."

At this meeting the most fiery of the active irreconcilables will speak, the chief being one Sandico who was a former member of Aguinaldo's cabinet and who in 1899 signed an order for the massacre of all Americans and other foreigners in Manila. The government will not interfere with the mass meeting though it is satisfied that the session will mean the exciting of the ignorant and the inflaming of the irresponsible to some overt act that will probably result in a few soldiers filling an island grave and several more natives ending their days suddenly. But the government here can not stop the meeting until some better reason than suspicion is given, for the cry of mailed fist and cruel oppression would go forth not only from the wily natives but from the native sympathizers in the states who know nothing of the situation here.

The Filipino populace does not idealize freedom and it does not waste much time in speeches or remonstrances. When a certain amount of oratorical stimulus has been given the impetuous black, he goes forth to free himself and he usually, after an unknown number of glasses of vino, seeks to lay low some careless soldier as the first token of his thirst for freedom and the blessings of peace and prosperity. But though the mass meeting may start a revolt that will take millions in money and hundreds of lives to quell and may undo the work that is progressing so well in various provinces the government for political reasons feels that it cannot interfere, and the warm-blooded natives may arouse themselves by fiery oratory on the day of mass meet-

ing as much as they please, the constabulary and police holding off until some act of violence is attempted.

D. S. church under the auspices of the Y. L. M. I. A., and Women's Relief Society, next Tuesday evening at seven o'clock to which all the clergy of the city and all others interested in the work of the Association are invited to attend and participate.
