SHOT AND ROBBED

A Passenger Shot, Robed and Thrown From Swiftly Moving Passenger Train

Columbus, Mont, Oct 10-Shot by thugs, robbed of Lis valuables and hurl ed from a swiftly maying passenger train, was the fate of a traveler on an overland Northern Pacific passenger train, who, from papers found, is be-lieved to be Louis Danemer of Ed-mond, South Dakors, Track walker early this morning discovered Denamer lying beside the track with a bullet hole through his head. He was breathing his last and died within a few

moments after he was found.

Denamer's pockets had been turned inside out, nothing valuable being found on the remains. The train from which it is believed Denamer was thrown passed through Columbus dar ing the night. In the man's incide vest pocket was found papers bearing the name "Denamer," and a ticket from Edmond, South Dakota, to Tacoma
