MURDER IN THE FIRST DEGREE

Such Is the Indictment Brought Against Albert Razor for Killing Ben Brown.

The Grand Jury found a true bill against Albert Razor, charged with murder in the first degree for the killing of B F Ross at a saw mill near Elgin on the 29th of January last. The coroner's jury exonerated him at the time and nothing further was done in the matter until presented to the Grand Jury.

Mr. Razor was arraigned this morning and entered a plea of not guilty and not being ready for immediate trial asked the court to set a date about four weeks hence, not wishing to have it postponed until the next term of court. Judge Eakin stated that he would look over the work he had before him and if he could so arrange would do so.

Attorney McLeod has been retained by the defendant and Crawford & Crawford have been employed to assist in the prosecution. Dave Cooper who was arraigned for the larceny of a horse from D W Johnson, entered a plea of not guilty and asked for a change of venue from this county. Judge Eakin denied the petition but it is probable that this case may go over to the next term.

Ed Cooper was also indicted for the larceny of a horse the property of King Despain. He has entered a plea of not guilty and it is probable that this case will also go over to the next term.

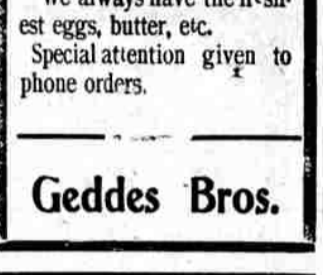
