The time is fast approaching when all eyes will be turned to the Lewis and Clark exposition. The people of the East and the Middle west will pass judgment upon the efforts of the people of the extreme west and the character of the exhibits at the exposition will be the base upon which their judgment will be made. It therefore devolves upon us, the people of Oregon, to see to it that the exhibits which we send there are worthy of us and our resources. This being the fact we should begin early to prepare our exhibits and select them with care and regard to their fitness. We have the material in this state, and in this county to make it a personal matter, to rightfully set before the visitors our true worth and merit. If you have anything which you think would be of interest or value to the state at the exposition let the matter be known and prepare the same for exhibition.

Pendleton now has a truant officer whose duty it will be to see that the pupil who is sent to school by his parents gets there and also to look after the parents who fail to so start their children. La Grande should take some steps to see that all the school children of school age attend the school. The law in this state is a good one and should be enforced to the letter. It is the duty of the parents to see that their children receive at least a common school education and if the parents fail to perform this duty of their own accord an officer should be appointed to assist them.

The case wherein the three La Grande boys have figured so conspicuously during this term of court should be a lesson to other boys who are inclined to be thoughtless and regardless of the rights of others. To be thoughtless is a crime in itself. No one has a right to be thoughtless. The mere fact that one acts without thinking is no excuse. The gun fired in a thoughtless way is just as likely to inflict serious injury or death as not, and after the shot is fired the excuse of thoughtlessness will not heal the wound or restore the life. Boys think before you act and you will save yourself and your friends a great deal of trouble.

It is sincerely to be hoped that the success achieved by Oregon stock at the St. Louis Exposition will have a marked effect in stimulating the breeding of fine stock in Oregon. Visitor after visitor who have come to Oregon to inspect its
