Northwest News

Oregon City has hopes of securing a new federal postoffice building within the next year.

The Oregon City Grange has passed resolutions favoring an anti-pass law to be passed by the next legislature.

Because the city council raised the license from \$400 to \$600 per year all the saloons of Vale, Malheur county have closed.

Taking off his hat he drew a revolver from his pocket put it to his temple, pulled the trigger and fell to the ground dead.
