THE JAPS GAIN STRENGTH

Little Brown Men Seem to be Good Finishers-- They Bury the Dead.
Observer Special
There is no resumption of the fighting of a general character on the Shakh river. Both the Russians and Japanese are entrenching their positions. Their outposts are within 700 yards of each other and less than four miles separates the main armies. A scarcity of fuel is causing the soldiers to suffer greatly from the cold.

JAPS GAIN STRENGTH
St. Petersburg, Oct. 26—There is no news of immediate importance from the Far East tonight. Indications are that both sides are heavily entrenching although it is believed that Kuropatkin is ready for a forward movement at an early moment unless heavy Japanese reinforcements compel him to resume the defensive. The reports that Japanese reinforcements are arriving, taken in connection with the enforced inactivity of the Russian forces on account of the weather is felt to be a grave factor in the situation.
There is reason to believe that the Japanese are drawing heavily on the Port Arthur army as well as on Japan in hopes of securing a numerical superiority that will enable Oyama to inflict a crushing blow upon Kuropatkin when hostilities are resumed.

BURY THEIR ENEMIES
Harbin, Oct. 25—A number of Japanese prisoners have been brought here. The Japanese are heavily fortifying the village of Lamuting. It is reported that the Russians buried 700 Japanese that were killed on Lone Tree hill. It is snowing here.

POOR BABY
Newport, R. I. Oct. 25—Worth \$10,000,000 in his own name, John Nicholas Brown 4 years old has arrived here with his mother.
John Nicholas Brown is a type of the "sterilized baby."
His grandmother is a great stickler for sanitation and sterilized, and even the big granite iron spoon with which John Nicholas makes mud pies is sterilized.
EVERYTHING IS STERILIZED
The milk, the water, the food, the clothing, the bedding—everything is sterilized.
It is a lonely and isolated life John Nicholas is living. He can't play with the gardener's little boy because he isn't sterilized, and besides he isn't rich.
He can't play with other rich children because they are not as rich as he is. He must try to let his nurse who gets \$200 a month, amuse him.
HIS DAILY PROGRAMME
This is the programme of John Nicholas Brown:
7 A M—John Nicholas Brown 4 years old, rises for a bath in distilled scented water.
7:30 A M—Breakfast; boiled egg from a \$3,000 collection of blooded Leghorn hens; ripe fruit, patent

breakfast food, and a glass of sterilized milk from a \$10,000 Jersey cow which grazes in a \$100,000 pasture.
8 A M—Dressed in silk underwear, knitted to men use, fine outer garments and a white broadtail coat costing \$2,600.
TAKES A SUN BATH
8:30 A M—Sun bath in big bay window.
9:30 A M—Kisses his beautiful young mother good morning as she goes to breakfast, and he leaves the house with his \$400 a month nurse for a walk.
11 A M—Drives his \$4,000 Buick roadster to a \$1,000 basket cart.
12 M—Lunch, bowl of sterilized patent food and sterilized milk from the \$10,000 cow, ripe fruit.
MAKES MUD PIES
1 P M—Mud pie making in the back yard in a pair of 25-cent overalls.
2 P M—Nap on a \$500 mattress made from curled hair from the tails of pure white colts.
4 P M—To the beach for a play.
6 P M—Hot dinner of sterilized foods.
7 P M—To bed in gorgeous \$5,000 golden crib.
