The following address was given by Chief of Honor Miss Fannie Cowen. Accident Order United Workmen:

It is the inestimable privilege of the members of Harmony Lodge No. 30 Degree of Honor to celebrate with you the 36th anniversary of your noble order. To those who have lived and died, we owe a debt. The present is a debt to the past. Our generation is but a legacy of former generations. Our ancestors were responsible for the civilization of today. The achievements, which we are entitled to so much, are but the imperceptible growth of our ancestors in some of the most fertile, cultivated and best by generation after generation. We are the product in its apparent perfected state. Science today reaps the reward of the science of yesterday. Benjamin Franklin by his famous experiment with a boy's kite proved that lightning and electricity are the same. It is Thomas Edison we are indebted for bringing Franklin's discovery to perfection.

It is very often that little things are instrumental in bringing about some of the greatest discoveries. For instance, the falling of an apple suggested to Sir Isaac Newton the law of universal gravitation. And so on through all ages. It is given to one to discover and to another to bring that discovery to perfection. With Christ came the transformation of the world. St. Louis, Oct. 25.—George Caniff, traveling salesman for D Gruen & Sons, jewelers, reported missing from St. Louis with \$12,000 worth of watches in his possession, was found at the Munro Hotel yesterday.

He was confined to his bed and suffering intense agony. He has been there for several days, too ill to communicate with anyone, while his firm, only a few blocks away, and his wife have been frantically searching for him.

Our Liquor Bill

In 1900 there was made in the United States \$95,789,443 worth of distilled spirits, \$247,200,713 worth of malt liquors and \$6,547,310 worth of vinous liquors making a total of \$340,636,466 worth of liquors.

In 1881 the per capita of all kinds of liquors, spirituous, malt and vinous consumed in the United States was 10.50 gallons apportioned among the drinks as follows: 1.38 gallons of distilled spirits, .47 gallons of wine, and 8.65 gallons of malt liquors.

In 1903 the people of the United States consumed a per capita of 19.98 gallons of beverages that will intoxicate, selected from the various kinds, thus, distilled spirits 1.46 gallons, wines .48 gallons, and malt liquors 18.04.
