TWO TERMS ENOUGH

President Roosevelt will Not Accept Another Nomination For The Presidency

Washington, Nov. 8—President Roosevelt tonight after the election returns indicated the result, issued the following statement:

"On the fourth of March next I shall have served three and one-half years and this three and one-half years constitutes my first term. The wise custom which limits a president to two terms I regard as substance and not form and under no circumstances will I be a candidate for or accept another nomination."

Horse Funeral

Norfolk Neb. Nov. 10—With impressive ceremonies the three thoroughbred race horses which were burned to death here were buried today in the town cemetery.

James Brown, owner of the horses, was not willing to send the bodies of his favorites to the city dump and arranged to have them buried in impressive style.

Three separate graves were dug in Mr Brown's lot, and wagons draped with black were used to convey the dead horses from the stable to the cemetery.

In the funeral cortege were Mr Brown, members of his family and all the employees of his stables. Hundreds of persons fell in line, and when the procession reached the graves the largest crowd ever attending a burial in Norfolk had assembled.
