MEMORIAL SERVICES ARE IMPRESSIVE

The Elks Pay Respect to Departed Brothers in a Beautiful and Most Impressive Memorial Service.

The Benevolent Protective Order of Elks has set aside the first Sunday in December of each year as a day for memorial service. The Lodge at this place yesterday did themselves proud in the manner in which they conducted the services here. The service was both beautiful and impressive, and no one attending at this service who was not a member could fail to see and appreciate the fraternity workings, that is, in regard to their love of country, their love of home and their love of honor.

The hall was beautifully decorated in the colors of the fraternity and subdued colored lights shed a mystic glow over the room and the audience. To each person who entered the hall was given an elegant program with the crest of the fraternity at the top and decorated with ribbons representing the colors of the order, all of which were kept by the recipients as souvenirs of the service.

The opening ceremonies were conducted with much dignity, Mrs W W Berry beginning with one of her incomparable voluntaries which was executed with the accuracy and delicacy of touch that accompanies all her renditions. The vocal music was simply exquisite, consisting of a quartette and solos by Mrs J J Carr and Mrs J Van Buren. Also the cornet solo by Mr O L Fultz deserves mention as being one of the best in the city.

Hon Chas E Co bran, of Union, delivered the memorial address, which was eloquent, touching, patriotic and full of fraternal spirit and love for fellow man.

The Eulogy on departed brothers was delivered by Col F S Ivanhoe who, in an eloquent and impressive manner paid tribute to the seven members of the Lodge at this place who have died since it has been organized.

The good traits and qualities of each one were taken up by the speaker, and dwelt upon at length. The virtues of the departed brothers were extolled, and in closing his address Col F S Ivanhoe spoke as follows:

But I hear the inquisitive, the critical and the curious ask:—“Did these brothers have no vices, faults or sins? Were they perfect?” I can only truthfully answer this by saying, well, they had faults, possibly, and could not have been, in all things, perfect. As you without faults,—perfect? Has it not been taught by one who “speaks as never man spoke” that none are perfect “no not one?” Did not the same Great Master rebuke the accusers of the sinning woman, where the penalty under the law of the time, was death, by writing her faults upon the sand, and saying, “Let him without sin cast the first stone?” And, if this be not sufficient answer now, let me go in to you the motto of this order, as it is inscribed upon the scroll of our sacred dead,—“The faults of our brothers we write in the sand; their virtues upon the tablets of Love and Memory,” and excuse me, if you can, when I decline to profane it upon the occasion of these eulogies. The charity of our silence, is the charity of Christ, it suffereth long, and is kind. Sweet be the dreams of those who have gone before and sacred the memories of this hour! And waiving the quantum of frailty let us ever bear in mind, that each life that is gone has taught its lesson; each life that remains, has its duty; and the future holds for us all, an unflinching faith in a just reward.

After the songs, music and addresses the ceremonies closed with the solemnities of the dismissal and the benediction of the chaplain.

Besides the immense crowd of friends and visitors, there were about one hundred and fifty members of the order participating in the ceremony. Those who were present will long remember this memorial service, and the Elks showed their love of the order by the number that were present.
