SOME NEWS OF GENERAL INTEREST

Gleaned by Judicious Use of Pen
cil, Scissors and Pastepot

Dr. E. P. Dixon of Grants Pass who already owns a large prune orchard is now planting out 24 acres more to Italian prunes.

The Roseburg Review reports that Mr. Bader, a San Francisco buyer has bought and shipped 11,000 boxes of fine apples from Coos County recently.

Butter continues at very low prices at San Francisco, the quotation for extra creamery being 20 cents per pound.

Oregon potatoes are quoted at 75 cents to \$1 per cental on the San Francisco market.

At San Francisco, Oregon onions are selling at \$2.25 per cental and Utah onions at \$2 per cental.

Two creamery companies each with capital stock placed at \$75,000 have been organized recently at San Francisco.

The Medford Mail reports the recent arrival of 100,000 fruit trees mainly apple and pear at Medford for delivery to planter in Jackson County Oregon.

It has been estimated that 1,600,000 000,000 dozens of eggs were marketed in the United States in 1902 at an average price of a little over 11 cents per dozen.

The Coquille Herald says Coos County is this year shipping the finest lot of apples, packed in the best shape she has ever sent out, and the people are learning that style goes a long way in selling even good fruit.

According to Hoard's Dairyman the average yield of butter per cow in Jefferson County Wisconsin is now about 260 pounds per year. This high average for a county with 40,000 cows is attributed to the fact that Jefferson County farmers as a rule stick to a special-purpose dairy cow.

There are more good apples on the Portland market this year than usual.

Four-tier apples of good varieties free from worms can be bought at retail at from \$1 to \$1.25 per box and fancy apples at \$1.50 per box. The quality of the apples is unusually good, but most of those now on the Portland market show that they will not keep as long as they generally do.—Agriculturist.

The Roseburg Review reports that buyers in Douglas County Oregon this year paid growers 16 cents per pound for live turkeys and 18 cents for dressed. The shipments for the Thanksgiving trade from Roseburg, Oakland and Drain amounted to 171,300 pounds and the shipments from Yoncalla, Dillard and Myrtle Creek raised the total of Douglas County to about 190,000 pounds worth \$35,000.

Horse Thieves

Word has been received here from Heppner that Mattison and Rea the defendants in the horsestealing case at that place have been convicted. These are the young men who a year ago last summer sold a number of horses here and at Sumpter which have since been claimed by other parties. Notice of appeal was filed as soon as the jury's verdict was received and the young men placed under \$4000 bonds which were furnished at once.—Gannett Gem.
