### WHEN CHINA AWAKES

China is a very old country. Its historians assert, that it was a great, populous and civilized nation when Egypt was founded by Menes 5,700 B.C.; that since it began its career as a great and populous empire Babylon rose and fell; Greece began to run its brilliant career of a thousand years duration and ceased to exist. Rome began when China was an old empire and perished "leaving no wrinkle on China's brow." She still lives with an area of 1,632,450 square miles and a population of 265 per mile and the aggregate of over 400,000,000 people, and great wealth.

Since the oldest of modern nations of the western world won a name and secured a place on the map of the world and began to make history the Occident has treated China with contempt and assumed that the Chinaman was an inferior being. A thing of laughter, sneers and jeers. "With no rights that a white man was bound to respect." Because China did not resent this treatment and become turbulent the western world looked upon China as a paralytic dozing its existence away in sleepy inactivity. The ambition of western rulers was attracted by the patient endurance of insult manifested by the Chinese, and the apparent indifference with which the Chinese viewed modern commercialism and mechanical appliances and began to plan the partition of China among themselves as colonial possessions. England, France, Germany and Russia began to make moves to effectuate this scheme.

The present war between Japan and Russia is the logical result of this European covetousness. The plucky resistance Japan is making to this scheme of European ambition is surprising the western world and causing its most careful thinkers to query "What will be the condition of the Occident should China awake as Japan has?"

This inquiry has attracted the western world and set it to looking to see if there is any evidence of the awakening of China. The searchers for this evidence were not long in discovering the sleeping giant shows unmistakable signs of an early awakening. Today there is an organization of Chinamen rapidly growing called the "Chinese Empire Reform Association," headed by Hong Yu Wai, a man of transcendent ability, a profound scholar in Occidental and Oriental learning, a great historical writer and an eloquent orator. The purpose of this organization is to reform China in conformity with modern ideas and conditions. This organization now numbers millions of members in China and has organizations in the United States and all other lands where Chinamen live. The members of this organization claim that the young emperor is in hearty accord with the purposes thereof and that as soon as Tsu Hsi, the Dowager empress, dies, she is now 67 years old, by a bloodless revo-

lution, similar to that which awoke Japan, China's 40,000,000 strong will awaken and demand the place among the peoples of the modern world that her numerical strength, territorial extent, industry and quickness of her people to learn and apply new methods, entitle her to hold.

The most important question ever asked the western world is: How will this new position of China affect it?

With her cheap labor, her skillful mechanics, her enterprising and thrifty merchants entering into the world's business a change will be wrought, which, if we are not prepared for it when it comes, the shock to our business will be terrific.
