PLAN

President Considering
the Creation of a
Commission to Gov-
ern Alaska.

Washington Dec. 8.—President
Roosevelt is considering a plan to
create a commission to govern Alaska.
He had a long talk this morning with
Senator Dietrich, who made a trip
through the territory in the summer.
Dietrich's plan is to divide Alaska
into three or four districts and elect
one commissioner from each and have
the president appoint an equal number
with the governor of the territory to
act as presiding officer of the board.
He thinks Alaska badly needs a mounted
police copied after the constabulary
in the Philippines.

Sometimes last night a water pipe in
