Leads Two Lives

Chicago Ec 13—Acting by day as superintendent of the printing department of a local manufacturing company and at night the part of charitable highwayman is said to have been the career of Edward Clark, now under arrest.

According to his confession he has played the varied role for a year. He has admitted being implicated in various hold ups which have puzzled the police.

Incidentally Clark declared that he had traveled all over the world and that on one occasion, while making a trip to China, he struck down and killed three of a crowd of sailors who had mutinied.

Herbert Boyer, also a printer, was taken into custody as an accomplice.

In all the robberies Clark is said to have been a chary able thief, returning part of the stolen property to the victim.

In one instance he ordered Boyer at the muzzle of a revolver, to return a gold watch which they had stolen from a woman.

In another case he says he and his companion were robbed by a bartender after they had robbed him. Clark's home is handsomely furnished.

MONEY SPENT FOR EDUCATION

The Commissioner of Education presented some interesting data and statistics of education in the United States

The number of pupils enrolled in the common schools during the year was 16,009,361, the same being 39.04 per cent of the entire population, as estimated by the Census Bureau, viz., 79,900,389. The average daily attendance for 1903 was 11,054,502, the same being 69.2 per cent of the total number enrolled. This is the largest average attendance on the number enrolled ever reported in the United States. The average monthly wages of teachers was \$49.98 for males and \$40.51 for females

The above figures relate to the public schools only. In addition the private schools are estimated at 1,043,876 pupils for the elementary schools, and 128,223 students are reported for academies and other secondary schools.

The total enrollment for the year, including public and private, elementary secondary and higher education, was 17,639,478 pupils, and to this there should be an addition made for evening schools, business schools, private kindergartens, Indian schools, State schools for defectives, orphans, etc., 648,440, making a grand total of 18,197,918 in general and special schools.

In 1903, 5-7 cities, containing 8,000 inhabitants and upward, and 689 villages, containing 4,000 to 8,000 inhabitants reported to the bureau. The aggregate number of public school children enrolled in these 697 cities was 4,274,071 pupils; and there was also an enrollment of 908,092 pupils in private and parochial schools; male teachers, 7,980; female teachers, 88,856. These cities alone expended, \$122,353,007, and their entire population aggregated 25,344,214 people.

Eleven Lives Lost

London Dec 12.—Eleven fishermen were drowned today in an attempt to assist the Norwegian steamer Anglia, from Hamburg for Sunderland, which was wrecked on the rocks near Newbiggin, Northumberland.

In response to distress signals twelve fishermen went out in a fishing boat which was struck by a heavy sea and swamped

A lifeboat subsequently picked up a single survivor, who was clinging to the fishing boat

The Anglia's crew is safe.

Ferry Boat Sinks

Bellair, O., Dec 13—The ferry boat Amelia, while forcing her way through the ice this morning sank in midstream. Ten men were aboard and all escaped by hanging on the edges of the ice. Some were almost dead from exposure when rescued.

Presidential Vote

The New York Times, democratic, on the 13th inst. gave out the following as the vote cast at the late presidential election from which it appears that Roosevelt received more votes than any candidate for the presidency has ever received. He defeated Judge Parker the Democrat by 2,546,119 votes and had a majority over the combined opposition of 873,400 votes.

"The total vote is given as 13,534, 119 and that for each of the presidential candidates is given as follows:

Roosevelt republican, 7,640,560
Parker democrat, 5,094,391; Debs socialist, 292,857; Swallow prohibitionist 248,411; Watson populist, 124,381; Corrigan, socialist-labor 33,519.

The electoral vote will be 336 for Roosevelt and 140 for Parker."
