**PONTIFF PRESIDES OVER CEREMONY**

**Pope Pius Presides over Important Sessions at Rome**

Rome Dec. 13.—In the presence of 60,000 people assembled in St. Peter's, Pope Pius X. this morning canonized Blessed Alessandro Sauli and Blessed Gerardo Maiella, descendants of whom, including Marquis and Ambrosio, Sauli and Negro, assisted in the canonization, a ceremony so rare in recent times that it has been held since 1870.  
 The basilica was beautiful with electric lights, its immense height showing the illuminations to perfection. The throne room had been erected behind the high altar and chair of St. Peter, having a device of rays of gold with a picture of the Trinity in the center. Altogether the throne took up a space of 9x70 feet. Four banners hung under the dome, showing the chief miracles of the new saints.  
**OUTRUST GREETED THE POPE**  
 The papal procession met in the Sixtine chapel, entering the basilica by the chapel of the holy sacrament. The pope, in full pontifical robes, was carried in the sedia gestatoria, with its historic fans. His robust figure and handsome head showed to the best advantage, and when he entered the church it was impossible for the authorities to re-

press entirely an outburst of applause from the multitude, which cried "Long live Pope Pius."  
 The scene was such as to evoke the devotion of the beholder, everything having been done to heighten the effect, and the central figure in the ceremonial presented a scene never to be forgotten. His holiness was preceded, surrounded and followed by guards of the court and high prelates. He looked pale, fatigued and less robust than a year ago, as though the triple crown were bearing more heavily upon him. The pope was thus escorted to the throne, the cardinals, archbishops and bishops forming a square about him.  
 The ceremonies that followed were interesting in the extreme. Pope Pius pontificated, preserving a calm, reverential air to the end, although, as he confessed later he was greatly fatigued.  
 After the ceremony the procession was reformed amid murmurs of love and loyalty. All the American prelates now in Rome who assisted at the beatification on Thursday of the saints canonized today were present, as was also the faculty of the American college at Rome.

**WOMEN USES A PISTOL**  
**MANIAC RAIDS CHURCH**

**Pursues a Fleeing Woman Through the Streets.**

Salt Lake Dec. 13.—Mrs. Jay Douglas, wife of the former city passenger agent of the Union Pacific here yesterday morning pursued Mrs. Fannie Martin on the street and through a store, firing a revolver at her. One shot took effect in Mrs. Martin's back making a slight wound.  
 When arrested Mrs. Douglas asserted that she had come down from Boise, Ida., for the purpose of killing the woman. Douglas was recently discharged on account of a scandal.

**Drives Out Congregation and Demolishes the Furniture.**

Grand Rapids, Dec. 13.—A maniac clad in a red undershirt and swinging an ax broke down the aisle of the crowded Fifth Reformed church early this morning smashed pews and chandeliers and drove worshippers in a panic from the sanctuary. A riot call was sent to the police and several officers arrived just as the maniac was beginning an attack on the big pipe organ.  
 Seeing the officers approach he jumped on the instrument, still swinging the ax. Policeman Slator was caught by the frenzied man and his thumb badly bitten. Another policeman was knocked unconscious with the ax, sustaining a gash six inches long over the eye.  
 Shots were fired to frighten the delirious man. One took effect in his forehead. He was then subdued and taken to jail where he bore the padding of his cell to bites, and was chloroformed. He was in a delirium and had escaped from a sanitarium.

**Portland Markets**

It is rumored that a corner may be made on onions by some of the principle wholesale dealers in Portland. If the dealers do succeed in combining, the price of onions, which is now firm, will have a tendency to boost the markets.
