NEW TELEPHONE LINE TO STARKEY

Built from Hilgard to Starkey by One of the Enterprising Citizens of the County.

Mr. C. N. Lewis the enterprising and progressive postmaster at Hilgard has today completed a telephone line from Hilgard to Starkey.

The building and installing of this telephone system was undertaken by Mr. Lewis on his own responsibility, and today sees his efforts crowned with success. The line is a double metallic circuit and the instruments, wires and other material used in its construction are of the very best material that money can procure, and the system is equipped with all the modern and up-to-date appliances of the best telephone systems in operation. Mr. Lewis deserves praise for his enterprise and for the efficient manner in which he has consummated the task which he set himself. This line will be open for public use, and telephones can be connected by those residing along its line. It passes through some of the most fertile part of the great Grande Ronde Valley, where are situated some of the best ranches in Oregon.

The terminal of the line is at Starkey, but it will touch all the intermediate trading points with stations at them. The farmers will not be slow to take advantage of the opportunity of having telephones put in their homes so that they will be able to sit in their own homes and have communication with the rest of the world.

Starkey is now connected with all the rest of the world and any one can talk to any part of the country where the telephone lines reach, as this system is connected, and used in conjunction with the long distance lines in this respect, Starkey, and all persons connected along this new line will have all the advantages of being in any of the large cities of the country. The entire Grande Ronde Valley is gradually becoming covered with a net work of wires, and the time is not far distant when each and every progressive farmer in the valley will have a telephone in his house.

Lose Their Office

Washington, Dec. 14—Frank H. Cunningham, of South Omaha Neb., a rural carrier who is president of the National Association of Rural Mail Carriers, and James O. Kellar, of Cleveland, O., head of the National Association of Letter Carriers, were removed from office today by Postmaster General Wonne, charged with violation of the president's order forbidding government employees attempting to influence legislation.

Dogs In Trouble

There was considerable excitement yesterday at Island City among the owners of dogs. The cause of the disturbance was the trial of one M. W. Nickerbocker, who was charged with marking dogs not his own. Several of the most valuable hunting dogs in the vicinity of Island City have undergone surgical operations at the hands of some unknown person and Mr. Nickerbocker was thought to be responsible. The Justice after inquiring into the facts concluded that he was warranted in holding him under two hundred dollar bonds to appear before the Circuit Court at the next regular term. The bond was put and the case will be further considered by the grand jury.
