THE TRUE HEALING

Nature Does It, But Man Can Help.—The First Principles of Osteopathy, Plainly Told.

ABOUT DRUG TAKING
Of such interferences with the work of the body, Osteopathy holds that the taking of drugs for the purpose of curing disease is one. This applies alike to prescriptions and to patent medicines.

Osteopathy can begin its work with very much better hope of success when drug medication has ceased; and its first effort is to locate the mechanical interference which has caused the trouble.

Now the trained Osteopath possesses a knowledge of anatomy and physiology that is second to none. It includes all the learning of the old schools and much that is new. It has been valued in a course of study more arduous and complete than any that is followed outside of an Osteopathic college.

THE PLAN PURSUED

Armed with this thorough knowledge of the human body, he makes an examination such as is never attempted by other physicians. It is no way harsh, in no way embarrassing, but it is thorough and the cause of disease is found. A bone slightly misplaced, a muscle in a state of undue contraction, a tendon hardened,—any of these may cause interference with the work of a vital organ, by pressure upon the nerves that control it, the arteries that supply it with blood, or the veins which carry away the waste.

OBSTRUCTION MEANS DISEASE

It is a proven proposition that a mechanical obstruction exists in every case of disease which does not owe its origin to a specific poison. In a vast majority of cases the patient does not know that any obstruction exists. He knows only of the resulting condition, and it is at this condition that treatment by the drug doctors is aimed. The Osteopath looks farther back and locates the cause.

The obstruction having been found, he re-adjusts the interfering parts by manipulation with his hands. This manipulation is not rubbing or kneading, and has nothing in common with massage, which is not calculated to accomplish anything more than a general stimulation of the surface circulation. Osteopathy has a system of manipulation peculiar to itself and by its use succeeds in removing the definite cause of disease.

PURPOSE AND TREATMENT

The whole purpose, then, of Osteopathy, is to find just what is interfering with Nature's program in the body and to so re-adjust the parts that the vital forces may have a chance to take up their allotted work again. And they will gladly do it.

Sometimes the trouble may be relieved with one treatment, oftener it requires a number. Much depends upon the nature of the disease and upon how firmly established in its wrongful place the obstructing part has become.

Treatment is most often at some of the 24 nerve centers along the spine. It is usually administered through a thin garment and is never harsh, embarrassing, or indelicate.—The Right Way.

Portland Markets

The receipts of turkeys today was very large and the market prices are consequently lower. The market is some weaker in respect to dressed turkeys and live ones also. There are however, slight changes in the prices.

The chicken market is somewhat improved over that of last week, but is not yet very strong. Wild game is coming in in small lots and finds a good sale at the quoted prices.

During the past few days it has been ascertained that fully twenty cars of fancy Oregon Burbank potatoes have been purchased by dealers here for out side shipment.

Onion growers are now offering their stocks at from \$2.10 to \$2.25, but a number of the larger growers are holding for an advance in quotations.

It is reported that an advance in the price of creamery butter will likely occur in a few days, as it is stated that the creameries are unable to supply the demand with the best quality. Today's quotations are as follows:—
