 Colfax Washington Jan 6—Charles Martin charged with murder for the killing of Frank Parker, was found not guilty by a jury at midnight on ground of insanity Judge Chadwick immediately asked the prisoner to stand up and as he did so the judge said:
 "I commit you to the penitentiary until released by a higher authority."
 Such a proceeding is very unusual and the outcome will be watched with interest, Habeas corpus proceedings will probably be instituted for Martin's release.

 The Portland Journal says; There were 1,630 births in the city of Portland the past year. Rating the population at 150,000 each individual in the city contributed .01 toward the increase in population by birth.
 The following are the monthly records of births; January 142, February 151, March 128, April 143, May 119, June 139, July 124, August 140, September 140, October 133, November 123, December 145.
 The deaths of the year numbered 1,351, divided among the months as follows; January 105, February 100, 100, March 120, April 117, May 110, June 123, July 91, November 110, December 122.
 According to these statistics the increase in population due to the excess of births over deaths is 279. At this rate of increase if the population of Portland were enlarged from no other source it would take about 500 years before the population was doubled
