Have Annual Meet

Dr. F. E. Moore and Mrs. Dr. H. O. P. Moore returned last evening from a session of the Oregon Osteopathic Association which has just closed its work in Portland. The following from the Telegram gives the outline of their work accomplished.

Oregon Osteopathic Association is holding its third annual session today at the Hotel Imperial and will adopt a strong resolution urging the coming session of the Legislature to fix a method of state regulation whereby the profession will be legalized and recognized as is other professions by the state. The physicians of the Osteopathic belief want this to guard the public against pseudo practitioners claiming to be Osteopaths, and to elevate the science. They claim that at present anyone can hang out a sign as an Osteopathic physician and claim a degree which it in reality requires three years of hard study to obtain.

The session opened at 9 o'clock this morning in the parlors of the Imperial with about 40 Osteopathic physicians in attendance. After an opening address by President F. E. Moore, of La Grande, an address of welcome was given by Assistant Secretary H. V. Adix, of Portland. Greetings were then read from Colorado, California, Washington and Missouri state associations, and from the president and secretary of the National Association of Osteopaths.

REGULAR BUSINESS TRANSACTED
The reading of the constitution and code of ethics by the secretary followed, after which the reports of committees, unfinished and new business was taken up until adjournment for luncheon.

This afternoon the session opened with a paper, "Osteopathy in Gynecology," by Dr. Gertrude L. Gates, of Portland. The discussion on the subject was led by Dr. J. M. Anderson of The Dalles. A paper was presented by Dr. H. E. Penland, of Eugene, on "Gastric Catarrh," and the discussion following was led by Dr. C. H. Walker, of Portland. A paper on "Pott's Disease" was read by Dr. H. S. Griffin, of Portland, and the following discussion was led by Dr. Carl Smith of Portland.

Tonight's session will open with the presentation of clinics and the election of officers. Unfinished business will be taken up and the recommendation that the profession of Osteopathy be put on a legalized basis will be formulated for presentation to the Legislature.

WANT PROFESSION RECOGNIZED

Members of the society urge that the science be recognized and placed on an even basis with other professions in this state. They base their claims on the fact that 25 other states in the Union, from Connecticut to California have legalized the practice of Osteopathy and placed it under state regulations, thus according the conscientious practitioner a degree of protection and other benefits which could not be granted to unscrupulous imitators of the profession. For the good of both the science and the general public, the state lawmakers will be urged to safeguard Osteopathy with state regulation.

MEASURE FAILED BEFORE

At the regular session of the Oregon Legislature two years ago an effort was made to pass a measure with the object of legalizing and recognizing osteopathy, but it failed to carry. The effort resulted in a lively battle between the osteopaths and the members of the Oregon Medical Society, the latter taking the stand that before osteopaths were fitted to operate for the cure of disease they should be able to pass the same examinations provided for other physicians. The osteopaths were not willing to accept "regular doctors" as members of the proposed osteopathic board, and the "regular doctors" would not consent to the passage of a measure without "regular" members, so the bill died.

Several attempts were made to resurrect it during the session, but each failed though the measure occupied considerable time in committee.
