ITEMS OF INTEREST

The new shingle mill at Shamokawa, Wash., is one of the largest in the United States, with a capacity of 30,000 shingles every 10 hours.

Passenger travel on the Willamette river has declined very much during the past few years. The decrease is very noticeable, and is complained of by the steamboat men.

At Moscow, Idaho, Fred W. Hanning was sentenced to five years in the penitentiary and John Knudtson to six years for arson. They were accomplices in the same crime.

It is recorded by the Lewiston Tribune that E. A. Wilkins, a rural mail carrier out of that place, handled 13,

882 pieces of mail during October, November and December last.

There remains an unexpected balance of \$218,323.61 from the fund Missouri appropriated for the World's Fair, and there is an excellent prospect that it will be appropriated for a Missouri exhibit at the Lewis and Clark Exposition.
