CIRCULATION STATEMENT
 The Circulation Statement issued by the Treasury Department of the U S for Jan 1 1935, reached the Observer this Thursday morning, the 12th inst. direct from Washington City. From it we learn that on Jan. 1, 1935 the General Stock of money of all kinds in the United States was \$2,839, 169,169 which is \$1,132,864 less than on December 1, 1934.
 The amount held in the U S treasury Jan 1 1935 in excess of the Government, was \$2,682,324 being \$6, 134,288 more than was held in the U S Treasury Dec 1, 1934.
 The amount of money in circulation on Jan 1, 1935 was \$2,369,321,138 being \$25,772,226 more than was in circulation Jan 1, 1934 and \$3,267,242 less than was in circulation Dec 1, 1934.
 The per capita circulation on Jan 1 1935 was \$34.16 for an estimated population of 69,365,400 on that date.
 There were in circulation on Jan 1 1935, \$1,768,584,406 more in circulation than on Jan 1, 1934 and \$2,343, 121,195 more than was in circulation in 1890 when the per capita circulation was \$5.
