AMERICAN FARMS

The U S Crop Reporter, a monthly paper published by the U S Bureau of Statistics for December 1904 reached the Observer on Thursday morning, from which we glean that there were 92,231,581 acres cropped to corn in the United States in 1904 that made an average yield of 26.8 bushels per acre, aggregating 2,461,490,334 bushels which on the farms had an average value of 44.1 cents per bushel making the whole crop value on the farms, for the year amount to \$1,087,461,440.

There were 26,865,855 acres of winter wheat harvested in 1904 that made an average yield for the United States of 12.4 bushels per acre and in all aggregating 332,935,346 bushels of winter wheat grown with a value on the farms of \$325,611,373. Oregon grew winter wheat on 402,296 acres in 1904 and harvested therefrom 8,609,134 bushels, an average of 21.4 bushels per acre valued on the farms at \$6,973,399.

The total acreage of spring wheat in the United States in 1904 was 17,209,020 acres that made an average yield of 12.8 bushels per acre and in the aggregate 219,464,171 bushels valued on the farms at \$184,378,501. The spring wheat crop of Oregon in 1904 covered 337,954 acres with an average yield per acre of 16.1 bushels, the total crop being 5,441,059 bushels, valued on the farm at \$4,407,258.

The total acreage in winter and spring wheat in the United States in 1904 was 44,074,875 acres. The whole amount of wheat grown that year was 552,399,517 bushels of the farm value of \$510,482,874.

Oregon gathered of winter and spring wheat in 1904, 14,056,193 bushels valued at \$11,380,657.

The oats crop of 1904 in the United States covered 27,842,689 acres, which on an average yielded 32.1 bushels per acre, and in the aggregate 894,595,552 bushels valued on the farms at \$279,900,013.

Oregon grew oats in 1904, on 231,842 acres and harvested therefrom 8,519,550 bushels, an average of 23.1 bushels per acre and a total value on the farms of \$3,247,811.

5,145,878 acres were cropped in barley in the United in 1904 that averaged 27.2 bushels per

acre, and in the aggregate 139,748,958 bushels of the farm value of \$58,651,897.

Oregon harvested 61,084 acres of barley that averaged 28.7 bushels per acre, and in the aggregate 1,753,111 bushels of the farm value of \$1,034,335.

The rye crop in 1904 was gathered from 1,792,673 acres that yielded 27,234,565 bushels of the farm value of \$142,706.

Oregon grew rye in 1904 on 11,135 acres that returned 160,344 bushels of the farm value of \$142,706.

The buckwheat patches of the United States in 1904 covered 793,625 acres from which 15,008 386 bushels were harvested worth \$9,330,768. Oregon grew no buckwheat.

Flax seed was gathered from 2,263,565 acres in 1904 to the amount of 23,400,534 bushels of the value of \$23,228,758. There were 2,331 acres of flax raised for seed in Oregon that yielded 12 bushels per acre, in all 26,772 bushels valued at \$32,662.

Potatoes were grown on 3,015,765 acres in U S in 1904 that averaged 110.4 bushels per acre and in all 332,330,300 bushels of the farm value of \$150,673,392.

Oregon had 37,489 acres in potatoes in 1904 that averaged 87 bushels per acre and in the aggregate 3,261,543 bushels valued at \$1,924,310.

Hay was cut from 37,999,602 acres in 1904 that averaged 1.52 tons per acre and in all 60,696,028 tons of the farm value of \$529,107,625.

The hay crop of Oregon covered 378,715 acres in 1904 which yielded 2.04 tons per acre and in all 772,529 tons of the farm value of \$7,864,354.
