Tokio Jan 13.—The Russian cavalry raiders have slightly damaged the railway between Anshientien, Hailien and Tashihene. There are reports from Korea which state that the Japanese garrison at Hamsheung recently defeated a detachment of the Ninth Siberian Cossacks near Honon, killing nine in the engagement.

London Jan 13.—A dispatch from St Petersburg asserts that the czar in his patriotism and munificence has contributed the sum of one hundred million roubles from his private purse toward the equipment of a third Russian Squadron and fifty million roubles toward the establishment of a fourth squadron.

Tokio Jan, 13.—The cruiser Tokino, on January 11 captured the British steamer Rose in the sea of Japan. The British steamer was bound for Vladivostok and was loaded with coal which the Japanese considered contraband goods.
