OREGON PEOPLE SHOULD AWAKE

A majority of the people of Oregon seem to be slow in awakening to a realization of the fact that our state is one of the most resourceful in the Union. She does not depend alone upon any one product but her resources are so many, so diversified and exact all others in so many points, that she could, if necessary, depend upon any one of them and still maintain her position in the first ranks of the states and be close to the head of the class. During the year past, more than in any decade before, people from the outside world have begun to learn about and inquire into our wonderful source of supplies and products which are shipped to almost all parts of the civilized world. However some of the greatest praise and the highest eulogiums of Oregon have come from the press outside of the state, and especially has this been true during the St. Louis fair. Not only did Oregon take prizes in fruit, milk, cows and many other things too numerous to mention, but the following comment, made by Mr. John Van Buren in the January number of the Strand Magazine in his article on "The State as a window dresser" and in reference to the display of hops made by the state of California:

The status of a horse artistically made out of hops, in which he lauds the California display, but in the same breath admits that Oregon exceeds that state in the production of hops. "It is natural that a state in which hops are a prominent staple product should in its windows make ample display of the useful vine. California stands second only to Oregon in hop production, and there is hardly a district of the state in which hop raising is not a feature of agricultural life. The hop exhibits at St. Louis are certainly among the most interesting, and visitors from Europe may well be amazed at the size of the ripened cones. Some idea of the size of these is afforded to the spectator by a splendid figure of a horse made wholly of hops grown by a prominent farmer of Sacramento County. No better evidence of the quality of the product could exist, for the hop horse, a bayard of display, draws sightseers from every part." Now if Oregon hops excel those of California, why cannot this state make a display at the Lewis and Clark fair which would be attractive and display to the best advantage the beauty and quality of this product?

Court House Fire Destroys Records

(By Scripps News Association) Chicago, Jan. 16.—A fire originating from oils and paints in the upper floor of the county building at nine o'clock this morning created a panic among the thousand or more employees in the building and in the City Hall which adjoins the county building. Four of the court rooms were gutted

by fire and many valuable court records were destroyed. A painter by the name of Edwards was seriously burned and two workmen are missing. The loss has not yet been estimated. (Later)—Two painters and one fireman were seriously burned. The fire was confined entirely to the county building and court has suspended for the day.

Anarchy Grips Russia

(By Scripps News Association) St. Petersburg Jan 16.—It is admitted in official circles here that anarchy prevails throughout the entire Empire, including St. Petersburg itself. This state of affairs is attributed by the officials to the fall of Port Arthur and to the fact that the defeat of the Russian Army in Manchuria is anticipated. It is admitted that the Russian statesmen are casting about for some means of bringing the war to an end.

MONROE DOCTRINE IN JAPAN

(By Scripps News Association) Peking Jan 16.—The Japanese Gazette today publishes a significant speech of Count Okuma former foreign minister of Japan, which he delivered at Tokio. He said that the Japanese must follow the example of the Americans whose ascendancy dates from the promulgation of the Monroe doctrine. He said "If we win the war Japan should insist that those foreigners now in eastern Asia must follow the Japanese will, while no other power should be permitted to obtain any east Asian possessions. Japan should assume herself the leader in China, Korea, and Siberia."
