The Scotch people of the county are making elaborate preparations for their big Buans anniversary which will be held in La Grande Wednesday January 25th.

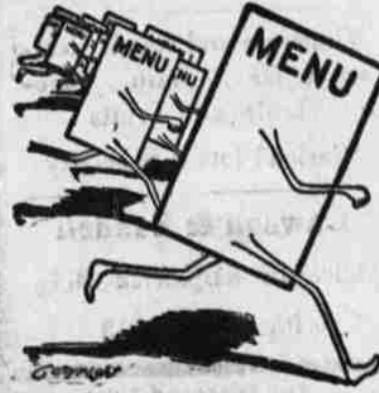
Wallowa County people are circulating a petition for an appropriation of \$1000 to be used for an exhibit at the Lewis and Clark fair. That is not so bad.
