The Scotch people of the county are making elaborate preparations for their big Buans anniversary which will be neld in La Grande Wednesday January 25th


Wallowa County people are circu lating a petition for an appropriation of \$1000 to be used for an exhibit; at the Lewis and Clark fair, That is not so bad.
