Died Amid Plaudits

(Special)
 Boise City Jan 18—with the name of his maker on his lips. Professor William D Carlisle of Spokane tottered to the floor upon the stage in the Y M C A auditorium a few moments after he commenced his address to the fruit growers on Tuesday evening and five minutes later the distinguished scientist was pronounced dead. He was stricken with apoplexy just as he was about to commensurate to the world the results of his latest discoveries regarding the fermentation and utilization of fruit juices.

Prefacing his address, Professor Carlisle spoke of the vineyard created by the Almighty in the Garden of Eden and how the Lord had made man and placed him in the vineyard to care for it.

"And here at the dawn of the twentieth century," said the speaker, "we find ourselves engaged in the noblest work of man, that of laboring in the vineyards given us by the Creator of all things, the Lord God Almighty.

As he uttered these words Professor Carlisle paused for an instant while the audience applauded. Before the applause had ceased he grasped his coat over the left breast with his left hand, raised his right hand, palm outward, on a level with his head, gasped and fell to the floor dead.
