MOSCOW NOW IN DANGER
REVOLUTION SPREADS RAPIDLY
MOB DESTROYS MACHINERY

Moscow, Jan. 24.—Strikers are marching about the city gathering recruits. As the Government printers have all struck, there will be no newspapers printed in Moscow tomorrow. The gas works and the electric light works are both idle and guarded by the troops, but as yet there has been no fighting.

STRIKERS ARE REPULSED
The strikers this evening have been trying to penetrate to the central parts of the city, but their attempt has been met with resistance by the Cossacks and they have been driven back.

**MOB FORGES MEN
TO JOIN THEM**

TROOPS IN READINESS
The report that Father Gopon is in Moscow can not be confirmed. If he is here he is keeping himself in seclusion. The authorities say that they have no fear of any serious rioting, but it is learned that troops are being held in readiness to check any disturbances.

SEEK SAURED PRECINCT
The strikers are acting with moderation at the present time, but the leaders are planning a monster parade through the principal streets to Kremlin, the sacred precinct where every Czar receives religious consecration. Troops have been stationed at the bridges across the Moscow river.

Up until noon today thousands of strikers had quit work and it is now estimated that at least ten thousand are now out. The employees of Hoppers Factories this morning refused to quit work but the mob, consisting of about five hundred strikers forced an entrance to the factory and ejected the workmen. The infuriated strikers did not stop at this but in their frenzy demolished the machinery in the factory. The employees of the tanneries were persuaded to join the strikers. All arms have been removed from gun shops, most of which have been closed to prevent the strikers from obtaining the weapons.

Judge Summoned

Washington Jan. 24.—The Senate today formally received the articles of impeachment against Judge Swayne, and were presented by seven members selected by House chairman Palmer. The House took up the charges, and a summons has been issued for Swayne, returnable January 27th at ten o'clock. The impeachment court adjourned until that date.

A movement is on foot in Baker City among horsemen for the organization of an independent racing circuit composed of Pendleton, Boise, Baker City and La Grande. All of these points are horse growing centers

and contain many first class horses which could be developed into a racing string equal to any in the north west. Overtures will be made to each of these places with a view to organizing a racing circuit independent of the north west association.

Rioting At Korno

SOCIAL DEMOCRATS
SEEK VENGEANCE
IN PROCLAMATION

St. Petersburg, Jan. 24., 12:30 p. m.,—Thousands of strikers have assembled in the Nevsky Prospect at this time and out going trains are carrying the wives and children of many prominent citizens to the outlying districts and seeking for safety. A number of the Government printers resumed work this morning, but thousands of them are still idle.

DESTROY TELEPHONE WIRES
The workmen are struggling through the streets in small groups, but as yet have offered to do no violence. During the night the strikers tore down the telephone wires which run from St. Petersburg to Tsarkoselo. An attempt was also made to plunder the big Universal Provider store, but the strikers were repelled.

DESTROY RAILWAY TRACKS
Fifteen hundred workmen broke out into the Sestorisk Rifle Factory and secured all the rifles in the building. They also destroyed the narrow gauge railroad from St. Petersburg to Sestorisk. It is reported that they have also destroyed a section of the railway running from St. Petersburg to Moscow.

REBELS SEIZE AMMUNITION
It is reported that the mob has forced an entrance to the Geniloff Ammunition factory and seized large quantities of ammunition, explosives and cartridges. It is learned that the rebels intend to march forty thousand strong to Tsarkoselo and make another attempt to see the Czar. If they persist in this determination, there will no doubt be a repetition of Sunday's slaughter, but if it happens, the clash will be more serious, as the strikers are now fairly equipped with arms.

OFFICIAL STATEMENT OF DEAD
The Official Messenger today claims that there were no serious clashes, and no casualties whatever. It also claims that the dead in the fight which occurred Sunday is only ninety six, and that there were but thirty three wounded.

REVOLT SPREADS RAPIDLY
The revolt is spreading rapidly throughout the entire county and especially in the Moscow district. The Bachruschin Michaeloff and the Em-

Under Schrader factories have also joined the strikers.

AUTHORITIES CONFIDENT
The authorities are confident that they have the situation well under control. There has been no confirmation of the report that the Emperor and his children had gone to Copenhagen. Father Gopon's popularity is unimpaired, but social democracy is fast assuming the leadership and urging people to violence.

GOPON WANTS NO VIOLENCE
It is learned that Father Gopon has sent the following letter to social democrats: "They have fired upon and massacred us, but we are not vanquished and the day of our triumph is near. Do not spoil our triumph by taking up arms and restoring to violence, but content yourselves with destroying the portraits of him who is no longer our Emperor." This appeal has failed to pacify the social democrats or the workmen who are still clamoring for vengeance.

ASSASSINATION UNTRUE
The report that the prefect of St. Petersburg and the Chief of Police had been assassinated is unconfirmed.

CLAIM REVOLUTION IS BROKEN
At seven this evening darkness prevails over the Winter Palace and the quay where the embassies are located. The authorities express confidence that the backbone of the revolution is broken, and say that all the prime movers have been arrested. Father Gopon has disappeared.

ATTORNEYS PROTEST
Three hundred and fifty attorneys of this city held a meeting today and passed resolutions in sympathy with the strikers, protesting against the Government in provoking bloodshed and declining to plead in courts.

REVOLUTION PROCLAMATION
The strikers here today are circulating proclamations and the people are eagerly accepting the documents which are signed, "The Russian Democracy." One of the proclamations, dated yesterday after describing the bloodshed of last Sunday says:—"Who directed the soldiers to aim the rifles Continued on page three"
