The question as to the value of orchards in this vicinity has been discussed in all its phases during the last few years, and will continue to be discussed, for in reality each fruit farm is a different solution as they all differ as the care of the orchard while young and the difference of opinion as to the varieties and the amounts realized therefrom.
Mr. Wm. Hall, of May Park and often called the father of that territory, now one net work of fruit farms, from the fact that he was the first to realize the qualities of the soil and set out an orchard.
This year he sold his winter apples to the Oregon Produce Co for which he received \$1500. This of course does not represent by any means the total income Mr. Hall derived from his ten acre fruit farm, for he grows large quantities of small fruits and berries which he markets here in the city. It is a perfectly safe statement that Mr. Hall receives more from his ten acre fruit farm than many who have \$25,000 invested at 8 per cent. Figuring from this standpoint what is Mr. Hall's fruit farm worth.

Grande Ronde apples are making a great record this year. The facts are this has been a hard season to place apples from the reason the outside markets have been overloaded with inferior and cheap fruit. Notwithstanding this handicap the Oregon Produce Co have shipped sixty cars of choice apples and the various markets they have entered is surprising, some to the Atlantic coast, to California, several cars to the Philippines and a few shipments to Honolulu.
These cars contained from 600 to 750 boxes each averaging about \$425, amounting to \$25,500, of course this does not represent their total seasons shipments for they still have their large basement and upper floors filled with Grande Ronde beauties which they are packing and shipping just as fast as they can secure cars and markets. Where ever our fruit has gone the buyers are anxious to secure more like it as fast as their trade can use it.
