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## RIOT IN WARSAW CONTINUES MORE MEN HAVE BEEN KILLED

St Petersburg Feb 1.—Representative workmen of all the large factories are conferring with Gen Tripoff, Next Monday the Government will meet all masters and representatives of the men with a view of granting workmen freedom of meeting. This order is hoped will end the strike. Shops of many Jews were plundered and an attempt was made to dynamite prefecture law court and police building at Seodive. At Paltust the police clashed with mob which was patrolling the streets killing eighteen and wounded twenty eight. A mob at Zeniors plundered shops and several were injured in the fight with police. The deputation of workingmen was accompanied by minister of finance Kokovaf and General General Treppoff the emperor was accompanied an entered the hall by the Grande Duke Mikhailovitch and General Hesse Minister of the Imperial court. The emperor addressed the deputation stating that he lamented the recent events which led to blood shed which he said occurred because the workingmen allowed themselves to be led astray by traitors and enemies of the County. He stated that he was well aware that the life of the workingmen was hard, but at this time of the nations need the industries must keep in a state of tranquility. He also stated that he considered that it was a crime for a rebellious mob to come to him and make a demonstration. After promising that the condition of the workingmen would receive official investigation the Czar advised them

to return to their work and dismissed them with "and may God assist you"  
His majesty listened to the narrations of the workmen's demands by deputations. He promised to hold an inquiry into affair brought forward. The Czar said: "We shall always meet revolts by military force, but we are sure workmen are devoted to us. We shall try to improve the conditions of labor." Upon withdrawing, the delegation went to church where they gave thanks for having been granted an interview.

Paris Feb. 1.—A bomb was found on Opera Avenue and proved to be harmless having been filled with earth by practical jokers. Manifesto was posted on doors, labor exchange walls and all quarters of Paris, calling anarchists to stand by the colors and signed by a group of anarchists. The manifesto reads: "Comrades we have work to do as well as Russians in running the governments, nations, castes, etc. Down with God, down with the state, down with society, down with rulers. Tomorrow insurrection will proclaim individual liberty."

Berlin Feb 1.—The Russian government's reply to China's declaration that she has not infringed neutrality nor permitted Japan to do so is a re-assertion that she has done so. The Russian note which was communicated to the powers Saturday gives specifications of what are affirmed to be violations of neutrality but the tone of the reply is such that it is inferred that Russia is not likely to carry the discussion much farther. It is learned here that Russia found that all the powers, particularly Germany, held identical with those of the United States on limiting the zone of war and keeping China out of it.
