MORE POWER

To hold the power of the great
Transportation Companies in
check, thoughtful men of all
parties in the United States
have reached the conclusion
that the government of the
United States is the proper agent
of the people to exercise this
restraining power. To effectuate
this thought there is a bill now
pending in Congress to increase
the power of the Interstate Com-
merce commission so that it can
regulate interstate commerce by
prescribing the freight rates. In
his address in Philadelphia at
the 42 anniversary of the Union
League in that city on Jan. 30th
in advocacy of the wisdom of
giving the national government
this power to control corpora-
tions, among other things in
the same line President Roose-
velt said.

"Unquestionably, however, the great
development of industrialism means
that there must be an increase in the
supervision exercised by the govern-
ment over business enterprises.

"Neither this people nor any other
free people will permanently tolerate
the use of the vast power and conferred
by vast wealth, and especially by
wealth in its corporate form, without
lodging somewhere in the government
the still higher power of seeing that
this power, in addition to being used
in the interest of the individual or in-
dividuals possessing it, is also used
for and not against the interests of the
people as a whole.

"At the present moment the greatest
need is for an increase in the power
of the national government to keep
the great highways of commerce open
alike to all on reasonable and equitable
terms."

"Less than a century ago these
highways were still, as they had been
since the dawn of history, either water
ways, natural or artificial, or else ordi-
nary roads for wheel vehicles drawn
by animal power. The railroad, which
was utterly unknown when our govern-
ment was formed and when the great
principles of our jurisprudence were
laid down, has now become almost
everywhere the most important and,
in many large regions, the only form
of highway for commerce.

"The man who controls its use can
not be permitted to control it in his
own interest alone.

"Doubtless no law would accom-
plish all that enthusiasts hope; there
is always disappointment over the re-
sults of such a law among the over-
sanguine; but very real and marked
good has come from the legislation
and administration of the last few
years; and now, as part of a coherent
plan, it is entirely possible, and, in-
deed, necessary to enact an additional
law which will mean further progress
along the same lines of definite
achievement in the direction of secur-
ing fair dealing as between man and
man.

"In some such body as the interstate
commerce commission there must be
lodged in effective shape the power to
see that every shipper who uses the
railroads and every man who owns or
manages a railroad shall on the one
hand be given justice and on the other
hand be required to do justice."
